Lansing, Mich. Oct. 1.—Gasoline tax receipts for the months of August and September, will exceed those for the corresponding months of 1930, Department of State records indicate. Complete figures for August will not be available but it is certain that the 1930 revenue of \$2,171,054 will be exceeded.

Unusually large attendance at the Michigan State Fair as well as at various county fairs and a huge influx of visitors to the American Legion convention will bring the September tax revenue above the September 1930 figure of \$2,009,570.

FARMINGTON JOINS COUNTY IN FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

All Agencies Asked To Aid In National Fire Prevention Week Plans.

Fire Prevention Week, which will be observed throughout the United States, October 4 to October 10, will receive adequate attention in Farmington, according to E. C. Banfield, fire chief. Chief Banfield states that all suggestions made by the Fire Marshall's division of the State Department of Insurance will be complied with as far as possible.

Some of the suggestions received by the fire chief are:

That schools be inspected by firemen, special attention given to rubbish conditions and exits, and a fire drill be held under the supervision of the fire department. Inspection should be made of dance halls, lodge halls and other places of assembly, the department warns.

That all owners of business places and homes make a special effort to remove all rubbish of a combustible nature from the premises. The cooperation of all civic organizations, City officials, school teachers, newspapers and radio stations is asked.

Your Telephone comes from India



In the transmitter of the desk stand telephone there is a thin sheet of mica, which has many other uses in the telephone art and in electrical engineering generally because of its excellent insulating properties.

A circular piece of mica forms the front end of the boxlike "button" of the transmitter. This is a highly essential part of the instrument, since the grains of carbon which it contains alternately are compressed and loosened up as the diaphragm is vibrated by the speaker's voice. This produces a continual change in the resistance to the flow of the telephone current, which accordingly varies in strength, thus copying the voice sounds and carrying them to the receiver.

Although near neighbors when placed inside the telephone instrument, coal and mica come from widely separated regions. The coal is a special grade of anthracite from Pennsylvania, while most of the mica used for telephone purposes comes from mines in the hills of far-away India.

Germany Leads In Europe

Europe has 29 per cent of the world's telephones. Germany leads with 9 per cent, followed by Great Britain and Northern Ireland, France, Sweden and Italy respectively. In total number of telephones, these countries also occupy the same relative position. From the viewpoint of telephones per capita, Denmark makes the best showing in Europe, followed by Sweden, Norway and Switzerland.

Telephones on Other Continents

In Asia, Japan has the greatest number of telephones, with a total of 355,546, and in Africa the Union of South Africa leads with 108,337. In South America the Argentine Republic is the best developed from a telephone standpoint. In Oceania, Australia of course has a commanding lead with 505,554 telephones, and New Zealand is in second place with 161,041.
