WALLED LAKE "11" DEFEATS PLYMOUTH TO CLOSE SEASON

Football Team Has Not Met Defeat Since Early In 1930

The game Friday, November 3, terminated in one of the major upsets of the season when Walled Lake overran the Plymouth grid-ers by the overwhelming score of 32 to 0.

One of the largest crowds of the year attended this game. This is Walled Lake's sixteenth consecutive victory. Walled Lake lost the first game of the season in 1930 to Plymouth, 12-0. This completes the year for Walled Lake with a final result of 276 points scored, to 18 scored against them. Friday's game was a hard fought battle with men being laid out on both sides, however none were injured very seriously.

Touchdowns were made by Lloyd Eno, who scored twice, Douglas Tuttle, Rolly Tuttle and Jack Champe.
