SPECIAL recognition was given to Sun Oil Co. for beautifying efforts at Ladd's Sunoco service station in the township. Sun Oil also received a letter of commendation from the Keep Michigan Beautiful commission for their efforts.

Mrs. Betty Frankel, garden writer for the Observer Newspapers, Inc., was honored for her landscaping efforts through her writings. Mrs. Nancy Kourjian of Earth Alive was cited for organizing a program at five Farmington elementary schools for recycling aluminum lunch trays. Recycling profits were used to buy shubbery for the schools.
