
STATE WAGES FIGHT TO STOP BORROWING LICENSES

Lansing, Nov. 23—The campaign being waged by the Department of Conservation against borrowing and loaning hunting licenses has received the apparent approval of justices of the peace, who are imposing severe penalties for the violation.

George A. Backscheider, Detroit, convicted of hunting on a borrowed license, was sentenced to 15 days in jail by Justice H. B. Kinney. Backscheider also lost a shot gun through confiscation.
