tire country as compared with last year's figures.

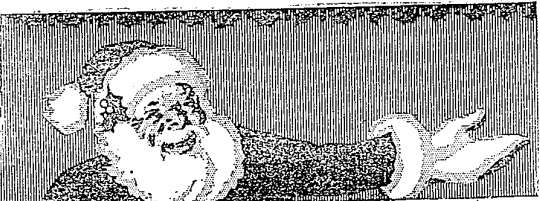

Radio Tube Test By New Machine Is Free

Farmington radio owners may now have their radio tubes tested by the newest and most modern efficient tube-tester that has been developed for the purpose. The tester is located in Farmington and testing is done without charge.

The tester was received this week by Farmington Hardware Co., and any radio owner is welcomed to bring his tubes in for checking-up. While most testers show only whether a tube is good or bad, the new "Jewell" tester in use at the hardware company's store shows comparative condition of tubes. Thus the condition of a tube which is not up to par nor entirely bad, but which might still cause faulty reception, is indicated exactly as to degree of weakness.

Any kind of radio tube may be tested on the new machines, only a few of which are in use thus far, although they are in demand throughout the country.
