METHODIST CHURCH IS REOPENED WITH FITTING PROGRAM

Many Improvements Made In Walled Lake Church, Rev. Ede Arranges Program

The Walled Lake Methodist church was formally re-opened Sunday with an appropriate program after having been closed for extensive repairs and improvements. The program was planned by Rev. Bert Ede, pastor of the church.

Through the liberal donations of time and materials of choir members, church members, friends of the church and the choir organization, the church has a new choir loft, a new rostrum, and a fine oak floor throughout the church auditorium. It also has a new cut stone entrance which greatly improves the exterior of the building.

The building program reaches back into last year when the basement was remodeled. A new convenient kitchen and a much larger dining room was made. Folding door partitions were built which divided the dining room into three class rooms. A new heating plant was also installed at that time.

The church membership has increased and also the Sunday school attendance from an average of nearly one hundred. The Ladies Aid Society has known financial success and a splendid co-operation. The inspiring anthems by the choir has added greatly to the church services, it is felt. Various classes of the Sunday school have contributed to the building fund, among them a class of young women known as the True Blue Class, which has been especially active.

During the afternoon program a bouquet was presented to Mrs. Adolf Halmhuber, wife of the Superintendent of the Ann Arbor District and one to Mrs. E. V. Mercer who through illness, was unable to attend the services.

TELEPHONE SERVICE TO REACH WEST TO HAWAII

Voice Link to Pacific Islands Scheduled to Open in 1932

The building program to house the wireless equipment which in 1932 will be sending telephone conversations leaping some 2,100 miles through space between this country and Hawaii is under way. One building is located some distance from Dixon, Cal., in a flat and barren area with scarcely a habitation for miles around. The location of the other station is within sound of the Pacific at Point Reyes, Cal., a desolate spot where sand dunes are the chief feature of the landscape.

Scheduled for opening next year, telephone service to Hawaii will be the first extension of voice communication directly westward from this country. These island possessions already enjoy a thoroughly modern telephone service, with some 25,000 telephones in use, of which over 70 per cent are dial telephones.

The receiving station for the Hawaiian telephone system will be near Kahuku Point, about 20 miles from Honolulu, while the transmitting equipment will be near Koko Head, some 12 miles from that city. Calls between Hawaii and this country will pass through the long distance switchboard of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company in San Francisco.

The Hawaiian Islands, well out in the Pacific Ocean, will be the present western terminus of calls from this country. Extension of radio telephone service from the United States to the Orient is entirely practicable, but depends upon the development of transmitting and receiving equipment in the countries of the Far East.

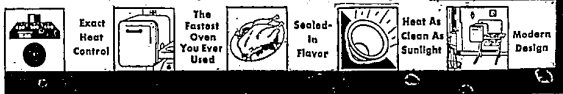


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
