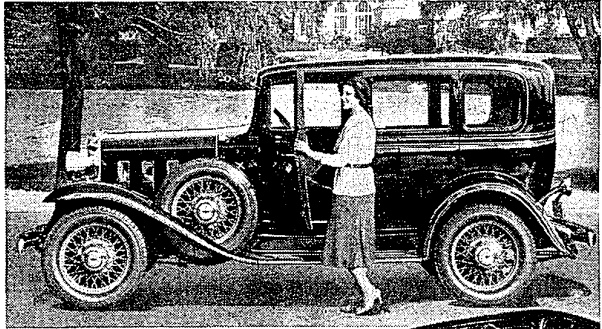


New Chevrolets Now Displayed Aid Employment Throughout U. S.

Chevrolet's new car for 1932, embodying silent, Spervo-Mesh transmission in combination with selective free wheeling, all standard equipment is at no extra cost, and practically every proven automotive advance of recent years is now displayed at dealer showrooms throughout the country.

While remaining in the price class in which it won a world record this year, the new 1932 model offers features heretofore considered exclusive to the high price field, as well as a new front end mounting never before shown on any car.

Called "The Great American Value for 1932," the line offers in support of this slogan a twenty per cent increase in power, faster acceleration, top speeds of 65 to 70 miles an hour, new "fisher" bodies with a modern stream-line styling, down-draft carburetion, counter-balanced crankshaft, fast-tough front seat adjustment and many other refinements over the 1931 models, which, from the standpoint of public acceptance, were the most successful in the history of the company.

Twenty standard and deluxe models are in the new line, of which the Special Sedan pictured above is the attractor. The lower view shows the new front end and the massive, powerful appearing hood enclosing the improved engine.

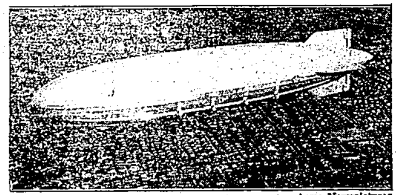

Navy's Newest Dirigible, "Akron," Has Much Telephone Equipment

The largest flying telephone system in the world, with 19 telephones, switchboard and three miles of cable, but weighing less than 255 pounds, took to the air when the Navy's giant new airship, the Akron, made its first test flight last September.

The switchboard is located in an opening between the control room and the chart room, and may be operated from either side. It is operated by designated officers as part of their routine duties.

Necessity for weight conservation was its responsible factor in building the system; the switchboard box is made of welded aluminum and the complete switchboard weighs only 30 pounds.

Telephones Aid Maneuvering
When the ringing key on the switchboard is pressed a musical sound—approximately the key of C—issues from the instrument to which the call is going. The instrument on the ship can be "rung" at once if desired, and the sound can be used for transmitting code messages. Should the captain of the Akron desire to talk to all stations at once, he may do so.

The 19 telephones are located at strategic points. Three are to be found in the gangway leading from the officers' quarters to the control room to the bow. The first of these is a general utility instrument serving the officers' quarters, the next is further up the gangway adjacent to important fuel valves while the third is in the bow itself, and is extremely necessary as the ship approaches a mooring mast.

Two observation and gun plot forms are located on the top of the Akron, and telephones are provided

DENVER'S FEDERAL BUILDING HAS BIG SWITCHBOARD

The largest United States Government private branch telephone exchange outside of Washington, D. C., is now located in the newly completed Federal building in Denver, Colo. It serves both the Federal building and the Post office building near by. It is also the largest private branch exchange board in Denver, with the exception of the one used in the offices of the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company.
