THIRD FARMINGTON RESIDENT REVEALS WORLD'S FAIR PASS

Secured His Pass At "Louisiana Purchase Exposition" In 1904

If as many Farmington people attend the next world's fair as have held passes to previous exhibitions, the community will be well represented. Most of the fairs of the last generation seem to have been attended by some Farmington resident who went back and forth through the gates without having to bother about admission charges.

To the holders of 1893 and 1916 world's fair passes, Ben Meyers and Carl Hogle, there is added one who enjoyed the merry whirl of 1904 at St. Louis. Benjamin E. Storms of Farmington dug up his pass to that event, known as the "Louisiana Purchase Exposition." The picture which identified the holder would still identify Mr. Storms—if you knew him well enough, looked closely, and disregarded the number photographed on his chest, in the manner of photographing a different class of citizens today.

Mr. Storms' number was M12456 and all his tickets bore that number.

The pass is encased in another memento. Everyone remembers, of course, the burnt leather articles that were "the rage" in those days. On one side of the bright tan case two flowers are burned into the leather, with the words "World's Fair" and "St. Louis, 1904," on the other side, "B. E. Storms, Guide 69, Harrisville, Mich." Harrisville was Mr. Storms' home before he came to Farmington.
