**Correction**

Sometime ago an article in the Enterprise reported that employment on the Grand-River widening project was being given to men on the welfare list. Persons on the welfare list had been receiving food to the value of 75 cents a week from the County, a family of five obtaining \$3.75 a week. The scale of pay decided upon by officials for men working on the road gave each man \$18.90 every two weeks, or an average of \$9.45 a week.

The concluding sentence of the article, however, stated that these men would receive this pay in addition to the welfare allowance from the County, which would give a family of five a total of \$13.20 a week. This was, of course, erroneous, as the road work was especially planned as a means of reducing unemployment and the number of families on the welfare list. Men employed and paid for their labor do not, of course, receive welfare aid.
