

#### CHEVROLET NOW EMPLOYES 89,000 PEOPLE IN PLANT

otor Manufacturers Now Have Normal Number Of Men On Payroll

More than 89,000 people are back at work as a result of the introduction of the new 1932 Chev-rolet, and \$20,000,000 worth of new cars or parts had already been built at the time of the pub-lic announcement, according to a statement released by W. S. Kuud-sen, president and general man-

statement released by W. S. Knud-sen, president and general man-ager of the company.

The statement follows: "Chev-rolet Motor Company has its nor-mal force of men back on the job after a two week's shut-down for inventory and an equal period of model-change shut-down during; the months of October and Novthe months of October and Nov

the months of October and Nove to do its bit in the last year has been to retain as near an equal number of men on the payroll as possible and the demand for cars; in addition, during the short demand periods, in ventory has been built up to crease the weekly hours to the greatest possible number.

"The result has been that the number of employees in any month during the year, except the shut-down month of October, has not varied more than 7% on a total of 34,000 men, and the hours have averaged close to forty per week; 39½ to be exact. When introventory takes place, no workman is required to turn in his badge but remains on the payroll until work starts to pick up again.

"Present force numbers 34,000 men working 4 days or nights per week minimum, and more than such as the property of t

Lansing, Dec. 16—The new Michigan law which prevents the issuance of a deer license to any-one who within the past five years one who within the past five years has killed or injured anyone in a deer hunting accident is being credited to the Department of Conservation for the small number of hunting accidents during the 1931 deer season.




