discussed. Charges that stale meat and other unfit foois have been dis-tributed to those on the welfare list were made before the Board of Supervisors Tuesday, and an investigation is to be made immed-iately, with a report, probable within the next ten days or two weeks. eeks

weeks, Complaints against the newly appointed County Poor Commis-sion, some of them from Farming-ton Township, were registered with the Board of Supervisors this week. Spoiled meat and poor dis-tribution of food were the major gradeness

week. Spollen meat and por ous-tribution of ford were the major grievances. Supervisor Arthur Coe of Far-mington Township said that peo-ple in his, community had ordered salt pork because the meat that had been provided them was spolled. Supervisor. Oliver Gibbs of Avon Township asserted that meat delivered to indigents in Avon Township asserted that the indigenty were charged 14 cents a pound for chuck mean, or seven cents more than it was necessary to pay elsewherp, on work orders. Supervisor Lamb said that sev-eral cases had come to his atten-tion where the inelasticity of the dole program was working a hard-ship on indigents and the Courty as well. Some families on the wel-fare list, it is claimed, receive an overabundance of some foodstuffs and too little of others. Similar complaints were heard from Avon Township officials who claimed that the Poor Commission sup-pled the needy puly with potaces and other products which they vere sometimes given by nearby farmers and that hey - lacked vegetables and milk necessary to prevent disease.

vegetables and milk necessary to prevent disease. Protests against the large-scale distribution system have not bleen corlined to indigents or to supervisors. Merchants and far-mers throughout the County have been deriouncing the system, for various reasons. In a vigorous freint page editorial this week, the Rochestey Clarida voiced the pro-test of farmersi against the pur-chase by the poor Commission of huge quantities of condensed milk from Nebrasks while dairy farmers of the County have on their hands large surpluses of milk which brings buit 85 cents a hundred or 1% leents a quart. Merchanis, particularly in Royal Oak, and in small towns, have been prolesting ragainst the losses of business resulting to them from the truck-distribution system. a considerable part of their trade having hear welfare orders.
