

TELEPHONE MAN SETS FINE SAFETY RECORD

Ascribes Freedom From Mishaps to Concentration on His Work

Walter F. Martin, a member of the cable splicing force of the New Jersey Bell Telephone Company at Farmington Hills, Mich., which he can well be proud. He has driven telephone company motor vehicles ever since the beginning of the automobile age, and during his twenty-five years of service he has never been responsible for any motor vehicle accident involving a company vehicle, death or injury to a third party, or damage to roads and highways, almost daily. His personal injury record is just as remarkable, for notwithstanding the nature of his work, he has never suffered an injury serious enough to cause him lost time or to make it necessary to place him on disability assignment.

Mr. Martin attributes his exception record in large part to his powers of concentrating on a job he is doing, whether it is driving a truck or splicing a cable, and he never exposes himself to unnecessary hazards. "Lots of times," he says, "the fellow with me thinks I'm getting paid to sit down. A matter of fact, I'm thinking so hard about what to expect from the fellow's running along the side of the road are liable to do, and I'm doing so much planning on how to avoid trouble, that I usually don't hear what the fellow at my side is saying."
