iffic property in which it has been invested."

the test cases before him, those of the Pontiac Commercial and Savings Bank and the Peoples State Trust and Savings Bank of Pontiac, the public funds could not be traced or isolated from other moneys, and so the second requirement for a preferred claim was lacking; the opinion stated.

"Human" Decision

The "human" element in the decision appears in the concluding paragraphs in which Judge Doty says:

"This decision may not be in strict accordance with established precedent and rulings of the Courts upon this same subject matter, but I consider it just and fair therefore good law."

"To hold these claims preferred would deprive the depositors of their rights and foreclose any possible immediate relief for them. This would bring about untold misery and suffering in hundreds of homes of this County, already burdened to the breaking point. If to do this is to follow modern precedent, the flight of common sense must be turned on, and precedent relegated to its proper place."

"Orders will be entered accordingly."

Affects All Banks

How much the decision will mean to the people of the County, unless interfered with, may be seen from the fact that the receiver for The Pontiac Commercial and Savings Bank alone will be able to declare a dividend of \$1,000,000 within 60 days. At the Farmington State Savings Bank, a dividend is also probable within the near future, according to Howard C. Knickerbocker, receiver for the bank. Mr. Knickerbocker said that it was quite certain every one of the closed banks in the County would come under Judge Doty's ruling, circumstances in each case being undoubtedly the same.

The County's claim was \$1,409,776.11 in one Pontiac bank, that amount being without depository bond. Judge Doty's decision pointed out that the bank had not wished to accept a deposit of \$1,000,000 in February and had actually refused it because it was not possible to obtain depository bonds. The bank accepted the deposit after further requests and conferences with county officials.

Not only declaration of a dividend, but reorganization of the Pontiac Commercial and Savings bank is made possible by the decision, it is stated at the County seat.

TAX LIMITATION BY STATE AMENDMENT ASKED IN PETITION

Stephen Tredway Circulates Petition in Farmington; Has 60 Signatures

A tax-limitation movement that has created some discussion in the lower part of the State reached Farmington this week, when Stephen Tredway, Farmington citizen, began circulating copies of the petition for amendment of the State Constitution so as to prevent taxes going above a certain percentage of the property valuation.

Mr. Tredway reported only one refusal to sign the petition, and about 60 names obtained Thursday morning. The petition would provide for an amendment, whereby total taxes on property for the year could not exceed one and one-half per cent of the assessed valuation, except for taxes to new interest and principal payments on obligations heretofore incurred.

The limitation, according to the petition, might be increased for a period of not over five years to not over 5 per cent, by a two-thirds votes of the electors of any district or where provided by city charters, which is the case with Farmington City.

The limitation would not apply to 1932 taxes.

While the movement met with favorable comment as likely to have a good psychological effect, toward the exercise of economy, it has been also declared impractical, because of the necessity of meeting certain fixed charges every year, which cannot be avoided.

FRUIT GROWERS PLAN MEETING AT PONTIAC SCHOOL

Michigan State College Experts To Speak At January 27 Meeting

The next meeting in the series for fruit growers of the County will be held Wednesday, January 27, in the Lincoln High School. The topics include spraying, apple varieties and fruit thinning. W. C. Dutton and H. P. Gaston, of Michigan State College, will be present.

A dairy profits conference is being planned for Oakland Co., which according to County Agricultural Agent, K. D. Bailey, will be held at Pontiac on February 11. This conference will be a business meeting of representative farmers and dairymen who will discuss the dairy problem of the county with the county agent and extension dairymen from Michigan State College.

The conference will be devoted to outlining a long time plan of work. This plan of work will help put the dairy business of Oakland county on a more highly profitable basis. Means of getting more economical production will be discussed with the thought that profits lie in economy of production rather than increased total production.

While farm accounts for 1931 will not show the same story they did in 1930, farm crop raters will doubtless use their records for project return comparison and for farm adjustment. Thirty co-operators of Oakland County will meet January 21, 22 and 23 at the Farm Bureau Office at Pontiac to check

in their books and get the new books for 1932.
