**4-H CLUB COUNCIL
OF OAKLAND COUNTY
PLANS YEAR'S WORK**

County Divided Into Districts To Facilitate Work; To Appoint Supervisors

Plans are being laid by the 4-H Club Council of Oakland County and the County Club Agent, M. H. Avery, for a big year in 4-H work.

Last year a large increase was developed in livestock work in dairy and sheep club work and the prospect here for a still greater increase this year.

The County has been divided into districts and each district is to have a supervisor, if there are a number of clubs organized in that district, to correlate the activities of 4-H work in that district. The development is towards the community type of club with all clubs in one center joining in putting over a united effort in their projects.

A leader's training meeting is to be held during March to acquaint new leaders with the outline of club activities and to bring the work of many different communities into closer relationship with one another.

The County has been divided into the following districts: Holly, W. Ortonville, Oakwood, N. Oxford, Seymour Lake, Clarkston, E. Orion, N. Rochester, White Lake, W. Highland, Milford, Lyon, Novi, Walled Lake, W. Bloomfield, Troy, Farmington and Royal Oak. The leaders and Supervisors for all of these districts have not been secured as yet.

Eleven boys of Farmington High School met at Farmington Methodist church Tuesday noon and voted to reorganize the Hi-Y club in Farmington, an organization that has been inactive since last spring. Louis Maas is president of the organization.

of questions, the two Supervisors present stated that they had opposed the change in the Poor Commission which led to the basket system. They explained, however, that they are but two out of 17 supervisors, and their opposition to the plan was out-voted. In answer to direct, insistent questions, they said that they have no particular unfriendliness toward the new poor commissioners, "as long as they treat the people right," and that their only concern is that the welfare be administered efficiently and with due regard for those on the welfare list.

Supervisor Coe informed those present that a special committee of the supervisors, appointed last week, is investigating charges that tainted meat and other unfit foods are being distributed, and that the quality and variety of supplies is being studied. Mr. Coe has himself reported finding worms in a package of rice, at the supervisor's meeting.

Editor Urges Unity

One of the features of the evening was a speech by a resident of the Southfield area who although he is not on the welfare list, stepped forward and urged those who are to stand together and fight for their rights. He said that he himself was working and supporting his family, but that the loss of his job might make him "one of you folks on the welfare."

James Cullen acted as chairman of the gathering.
