'Hate, Fear'

EDITOR:

On Oct. 11, I attended what was billed as a panel discussion on bussing at the high school. The panel was composed of Mrs. Gert Walsh, who was to act as moderator; Mrs. Irene McCabe of Poiniac, anti-bussing leader; Charles Harrison, a black representative of NAACP; and superintendent of Clarenceville Schools, David McDowell.

The format of the evening as Mrs. Walsh explained, was to be a question-and-answer session, each person being allowed to ask questions of the panel.

For two hours I sat, listened and cried inwardly, for I had actually attended an anti-bussing rally. The reason for my attending was to hear possible solutions and alternatives to bussing, what would happen to Detroit children's education if the bussing plan failed, and to hear both sides of the issue.

Instead, I heard nothing but hearing their feeling why they were against bussing. They were cheered by the crowd. A few times students would try and speak, saying they were for bussing, but they were shouted down by the crowd.

Finally, Mrs. McCabe stood to speak, saying she knew what was best for the students, and the students should sit down and be quiet. Then she proceeded to tell us what we could and should do, to end the threat of bussing. What a panel discussion!

I sat in the audience with my 15-year daughter, who is a junior at Clarenceville High. Neither of us spoke, we both felt it useless to try and explain our feelings to the "responsible adults" who sat in the auditorium. The mood of the people seemed to be one of hate and fear.

I, too, am fearful, fearful not of my children's safety if they should be bused to another school, but fearful of my white counterparts here in Clarenceville if black students should come here.

The parents, Mrs. McCabe and Mrs. Walsh did not seem to care what the students involved wanted, if they would mind going to another school or having black students coming to theirs.

Why are we so afraid to expose our children to black children? Are not all children entitled to equal education? If bussing does become an actuality, I will place my children on a school bus. I will not be as some parents have said they will do, place my child in a so-called "freedom school," or keep my child out of school completely. Our children are our hope for a better world. They are not born with prejudices, that is taught to them by their parents.

the young adults attending the meeting were rude. The rudeness and intolerance was, in fact, more blatantly visible in the adult audience.

One particular young man aroused a most curious reaction. He made a fervent and animated statement in favor of bussing and brought the majority of adults to their feet in a state of frenzy. They yelled, shook their fists and referred to him in such mature terminology as "animal, radical, traitor," etc. They neither listened nor afforded him the common courtesy of expressing a personal opinion.

The question occurred to me, "Why can't this group of adults listen rationally to his point of view?" And the fact of the matter was that every youngster who spoke was impelled to begin with a statement rejecting the concept of bussing in order to be heard. This scene could have taken place thousands of years ago in the Roman Coliseum.

Granted, the issue is charged with the fear of the unknown, with the fear of losing one's security in the institutions of learning. The issue is indeed one with which every conscientious parent must agonize.

However, it is unfortunate that in opposing bussing, the citizens feel compelled to be a Mrs. McCabe supporter. Mrs. McCabe, indeed, has one cause. But it is not anti-bussing. Her audience "crusade" consists of arousing the basest instincts in human behavior and preventing an atmosphere in which calm discussion and consideration of the problem can take place.

Scaled bids for the purchase of general obligation bonds to be issued by Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, of the par value of One Million (\$1,000,000) Dollars will be received by the undersigned at 2900 West Eight Mile Road, Farmington, Michigan 48024, on said School District on Thursday, the 23rd day of November, 1971, until 10:00 o'clock a.m. Eastern Standard Time at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

Said bonds will be dated September 1, 1971, will be coupon bonds, the entire issue to be in the denomination of \$5,000.00 each, will be numbered consecutively in order of their maturities from 1 to 200, inclusive, shall bear interest from their date of issue at a rate not to exceed seven and one-half (7 1/2) per cent per annum, expressed in multiples of 1/8 of 1 per cent, and shall be payable semi-annually on June 1 and December 1 of each year, both principal and interest to be payable at a bank or trust company qualified to act as paying agent under the statutes of the State of Michigan or the Federal Government, to be designated by the original purchaser of said bonds, who may also designate a co-paying agent having the qualifications which paying agents shall be approved by the School District. Said interest rate on any one bond shall be at one rate only and all bonds maturing in any one year must carry the same interest rate and each coupon period shall be represented by one interest coupon only. Accrued interest in date of delivery of each bond shall be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery. No bonds may bear interest at a rate which is less than 50% of the rate borne by any other bonds of this issue.

Said bonds will mature serially as follows: \$ 25,000.00 on June 1st of each year from 1973 to 1990, inclusive; \$ 50,000.00 on June 1st of 1991 to 1992, inclusive; \$ 75,000.00 on June 1st of each year from 1993 to 1995, inclusive; \$100,000.00 on June 1st of 1996, and \$125,000.00 on June 1, 1997.

Bonds maturing in the years 1973 to 1992, inclusive, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.

Bonds maturing in the years 1993 to 1997, inclusive, shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity in whole or in part at the option of the School District and if in part, in inverse numerical order, on any interest payment date on or after June 1, 1992, at par and accrued interest thereon to the date fixed for redemption, plus a premium for each bond so redeemed as follows:

- 2. if redeemed on or after June 1, 1992, but prior to June 1, 1995; 1.25% if redeemed on or after June 1, 1995, but prior to June 1, 1996; 1.50% if redeemed on or after June 1, 1996, but prior to June 1, 1997; 1.75% if redeemed on or after June 1, 1997, but prior to June 1, 1994.

No premium will be paid on bonds called for redemption on or after June 1, 1994.

Notice of redemption shall be given to the holders of the bonds to be redeemed by publication not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for redemption at least once in a newspaper or publication circulated in the State of Michigan which carries, as part of its regular service, notices of sale of municipal bonds, and in case of registered bonds thirty (30) days notice by registered mail shall be given to each registered owner at his registered address. No further interest payable on bonds so called for redemption shall accrue after the date fixed for redemption of said bonds, whether said bonds are presented for redemption or not, provided

The School District has money available for such redemption with the Paying Agent.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from January 1, 1972, to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid, on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the School District. Each bidder shall state in his bid the interest cost to the School District, computed in the manner above specified. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds, or at a price less than 100% of their par value will be considered.

The bonds of this issue may be registrable as to principal only on books kept by the Paying Agent.

The bonds are to be issued for the purpose of paying the cost of completing, remodeling, improving, furnishing and equipping school buildings, athletic fields and other facilities, of erecting additional school buildings and improvement and of building and equipping athletic fields and playgrounds. Said authority to borrow to acquire and carry the unsold balance of bonds on the amount of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) approved by the voters of the School District at the special election held on March 23, 1969.

The full faith and credit of the School District is pledged for the payment of these bonds, and the School District is obligated to levy ad valorem taxes annually in an amount sufficient to provide for payment of the principal and interest on the bonds, when due, in accordance with the requirements of the Constitution and laws of the State of Michigan, which taxes are without limitation as to rate or amount.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$20,000.00, drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the School District must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder to be forfeited as liquidated damages if each bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks, and checks of unaccepted bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified approving opinion of Miller, Canfield, Park & Stone, attorneys of Detroit, Michigan, which opinion will be printed on each bond and will be furnished without expense to the purchaser of the bonds at the delivery thereof. The School District shall furnish bonds ready for execution at its expense. Bonds will be delivered without expense to the purchaser at Detroit, Michigan, New York, New York, or Chicago, Illinois. The usual closing documents, including a certificate that no litigation is pending, affecting the issuance of said bonds, will be delivered at the time of delivery of the bonds.

Payments shall be made on Federal Reserve Funds. The right is reserved to reject any or all bids.

Envelopes containing the bids should be plainly marked "Proposals for School Bonds".
