

Vandals Close Down Paper Burning Center

FARMINGTON Vandals have closed down Farmington's central storage area for newspaper salvage and sent its sponsors on the hunt for a permanent shelter.

"We need a building or shelter which someone either will donate or rent for a reasonable amount," said Mrs. Nancy Kourjian of Earth Alive, sponsor of the ecological effort.

UNTIL A NEW location is found, Mrs. Kourjian advises Farmington folks to take their stored-up newspapers to centers at Southfield or Redford Township.

"We had just got used to the location at First Presbyterian

Church," Mrs. Kourjian mourned, "when the minister told us the vandals had come just too much. Kids tore up the newspapers stored there and scattered them all over the parking lot. They even set them afire and overturned the Boy Scout trailer."

On the bright side, the glass recycling center at Oakland Community College still is going strong, Mrs. Kourjian said. As a matter of fact, three more barrels have been donated to the site to bring the total to six.

ANY CIVIC minded citizen who would like to donate brown, green and white paint

will find a grateful welcome, she added.

Her group would like to paint the barrels in the three colors so salvagers can sort their bottles by color and place them in the proper container. They need not remove labels from bottles and jars, Mrs. Kourjian said, but there is insistence that metal caps and rings be removed.

Until a new location is found, Farmington recyclers may take their newspapers to Southfield's new center, located in the city's former animal shelter, at 28000 Berg Road, about a half-mile north of 10 Mile. The Southfield center also salvages bottles,

jars and other glass. It is open Monday through Friday.

Another recycling location, which takes cans as well as glass and paper, is in Redford Township at 12200 Beech-Daly near Plymouth Road.

The Redford location operates on Fridays from 3-6 p.m., Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Sundays 2-6 p.m.

Candidate Urges Stand On Bussing

FARMINGTON John J. Courville, candidate for Farmington City Council, says he is disappointed at the council's refusal to adopt a resolution, pro or con, on the bussing question.

Courville, speaking to fellow directors of the Farmington Chamber of Commerce at the last board meeting, said he was concerned by the lack of concern by some councilmen regarding the bussing situation.

"It has been a long-standing office holder at any level to avoid those issues which are most controversial," said Courville.

"However, it is imperative that school boards, city and township governments and elected county and state officials make their viewpoints known at this time."

"Some public protest must certainly have some effect on these officials who will determine the ultimate outcome of this highly controversial question. I strongly urge the council to reconsider its position in regards to an anti-bussing resolution."

Many parents might be concerned about their children gathering treats on Halloween night. A suggestion has been made that residents place on the treats they distribute a self-sticking label with their name and address on it.

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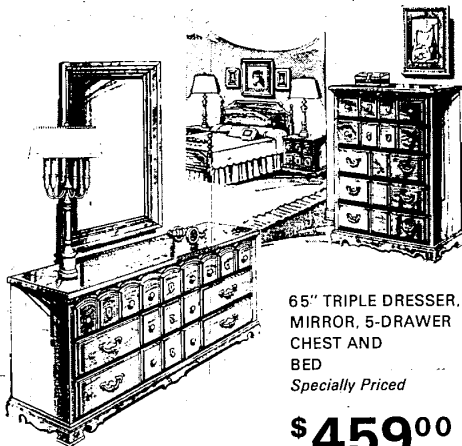
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
