meantime his capability had resulted in his being placed in charge of the yard, which had been paid by Mr. Otis to the present owners. He was then called to a position at the Redford office, operated by the same firm.

Promotion which he had earned at Redford came to Mr. Hogle just a few weeks ago. With the death of Judson B. Martin, Mr. Hogle was made manager of the Redford office, but his enjoyment of this position was short-lived. His death occurred just one month to the day after he had taken charge of the Redford office.

Although he had been away from Farmington for eight years, Mr. Hogle maintained his interest in affairs of his home town and clung firmly to his friendships and contacts in Farmington, particularly among those with whom he had grown up. By his energetic interest in all about him and genial good-nature, Mr. Hogle made his personality felt whenever a group gathered, of which he was one.

Assists Needy

His charitable work won State-wide recognition in the autumn of 1930, when he "returned for evil" in connection with an event occurring at his place of business. A Brightmoor man was caught stealing coal from the Redford yard which was under Mr. Hogle's supervision.

Impressed with the unfortunate circumstances which had led to such an occurrence, Mr. Hogle promptly donated 50 tons of coal for distribution among 54 needy families of the district. His act of kindness gained the attention and widespread approval of newspapers throughout the State.

Was Past Master

Mr. Hogle was a past master of Farmington Lodge No. 151, F. & A. M. and a member of Redford Royal Arch Masons, Knight Templars at Northville, Moslem Temple at Detroit, and of Redford Exchange Club. He was one of the committee of the latter club which came to Farmington to organize the Farmington Exchange Club. At Redford he had served on the club's board of control.

Mr. Hogle was married to Alma Ely on October 26, 1917. One son was born to them, Gordon W. now 11 years old.

Surviving besides the widow and son are Mr. Hogle's parents, Mr. and Mrs. James L. Hogle of Farmington; a sister, Mrs. Norine Simmons of Northville, and his brother, Carl, of Farmington. Rev. Lawrence Midworth of Trenton, a relative of Mrs. Hogle officiated at the services, which occurred on the birthday of Mrs. Hogle's mother, Mrs. Addie Ely.

CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY TO HAVE LOWER GAS RATES

Company Estimates That Saving Of \$150,000,000 Will Be Made

Consumers Power Company has filed with the State Utilities Commission at Lansing a downward revision of its domestic gas rates, largely benefitting the smaller consumers. By extending to every home the benefits of the low gas rate now exclusive to those with gas water heaters. It is estimated that this means a reduction in excess of \$150,000,000 in the cost of gas generally to that class of customers who need it most.

Application of the revised domestic rate has required an individual survey of every domestic gas customer's account and appliances in every large proportion of the homes which this Company supplies with gas service in the Pontiac District. This work will be completed, and the revised rate put into effect on all bills sent out on or after March 1.

This rate adjustment conforms to the request of the City of Pontiac, made after considerable investigation and consideration, and also to the understanding with the respective representatives of the various municipalities throughout the County served with gas service from Pontiac.

Funeral services for Harry Booth of Detroit, a brother-in-law of Mrs. W. P. Thompson of Farmington, were held Thursday afternoon from a Detroit funeral home. Mr. Booth died suddenly Monday afternoon of a heart attack. He was 32 years old.

his list. The total is now 265 bottles of free milk dispensed to the children daily.

In January a total of 4,095 bottles was distributed to pupils of the four schools.

Boy "Gets No Breakfast"

Mr. Himmelspach reported an instance in which a boy attending one of the schools said that the bottle of free milk had been serving as one of his daily meals. That his parents were able to provide him either with breakfast or lunch, but not both. On motion of Dr. Z. R. Aschenbrenner, Mr. Himmelspach and Mr. Warner were designated as a committee to investigate conditions of this kind and report any cases of children going to school without breakfast.

Offer Prizes For Letters

The same men will act as a committee in a letter contest. Each pupil receiving free milk in the four schools will be asked to write a letter to the Club, describing the benefits of drinking milk. A prize of one dollar will be given for the best letter in each grade. Exchange Club members donated nine dollars for the prizes Wednesday. Mr. Himmelspach reported that he has already received some interesting letters from pupils on the subject.

One member reported an amusing situation created by the free-milk distribution. His son had always previously refused to drink his milk at home, where there is always a plentiful supply, but since the milk is distributed at the school he willingly drinks his milk there, the only reason being that the other pupils do it—it's become quite the fashion at school. Similar reactions among the boys were reported by other members.
