The course will consist of three meetings, one each week beginning the week of February 29.

The topic for the first meeting February 29 will be "The Value of Objectives in 4-H Work" by Dr. Austin, of the Michigan State College, Dean of the Liberal Arts Division.

Dr. Austin was formerly an Agricultural teacher, then later a State 4-H Club Leader in Illinois, and so is well prepared to handle this topic.

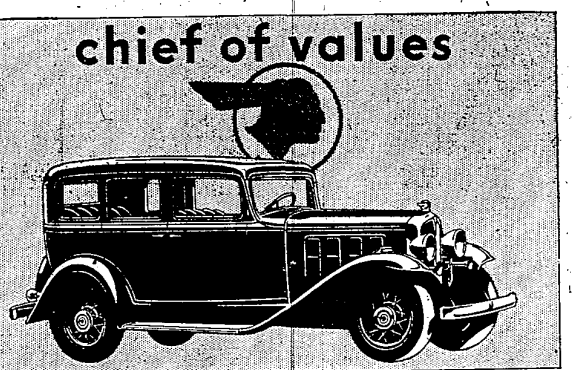
