Improvement In Prisons Is Told By F. M. Butzel

detailed account of a revolutionary change which took place overnight about fifteen years ago at one institution, the Detroit House of Correction. Conditions there at the time caused complaint Mr. Butzel related and an investigation was undertaken, which resulted in resignations of the entire board of directors.

Warden, Others, Quit
Soon after the new board took charge, the warden, believing his resignation was to be asked, offered his resignation, along with that of his wife, who was the matron. At the same time a number of others on the staff of the prison also resigned, with all resignations to be effective at once.

Meanwhile, the new Board had voted by a margin of one to accept the resignation of the warden, whereupon the resignation of the warden, who had favored the warden, also resigned. The House of Correction was thus left without a president of the board of directors, guiding head, warden, or staff.

Woman Takes Hold
At this point, Mr. Butzel related, the courage and firmness of a woman brought order out of the chaos. Dr. Mary Thompson Stevens, who was vice-president, had automatically become president of the board, and took the situation in hand. She declared that she would be the warden, and would take charge from that moment, although she had come to the meeting late, unprepared for any such contingency.

Dr. Stevens suggested that inasmuch as she would be "running the hotel" thereafter, it would be well if she were introduced to her "guests." The prisoners were called out to the yard and a director, Dr. Oakman, now dead, mounted a barrel and introduced Dr. Stevens. He told the prisoners what had happened and that Dr. Stevens had intended to improve conditions. He asked the prisoners to support the new warden.

Prisoners Pledge Support
Upon the conclusion of the director's appeal, one of the prisoners, a Detroit attorney who had been jailed as a conscientious objector to the World War draft, and was popular throughout the prison, addressed his fellow-inmates urging them to support the new warden in every way. Each prisoner pledged himself to do so.

Improvements were made in the diet of the inmates, and they were allowed to go into the yard for an hour each afternoon. They formed baseball teams, played musical instruments, and the health and morale of the prison was markedly raised. Production in the chair factory, in which the prisoners were worked, increased sharply immediately thereafter.

It was on the day after the meeting when Dr. Stevens took charge that Senator James Couzens, then mayor of Detroit, asked Mr. Butzel to accept appointment to the board of directors, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of the former president.

Dr. Stevens remained in charge as warden for six months. One of the unusual institutions of Michigan is the Training School for Boys at Lansing, Mr. Butzel said. There they learn to become skilled mechanics of various kinds. The school is classified as a school of similar character, the speaker stated.

Mr. Butzel was introduced by Miss Merlah Andrews, who was instrumental in bringing him to Farmington. The meeting was held at the home of Mrs. E. F. Holcomb.
