**Farmington Bank Is Cleared In Statement**  
(Continued from page one)

later the property returned to Mr. Harger, and that the bank loaned \$10,000 on a first mortgage to enable him to put the farm in condition. We find that later Mr. Harger made a loan on a second mortgage to the bank to enable him to install cider-making machinery, and he proposed engaging in the manufacture of cider for the Detroit market.

"We add that the bank was amply secured at the time these loans were made and we further find that Edgar Pierce was at no time directly interested in this matter; that Mr. Pierce's interest was limited to the fact that he had personally advanced funds to Mr. Harger, which personal funds were to be repaid to Mr. Pierce from the profits of the business, if, as and when they accrued.

"In April, 1931, Howard M. Warner and Harley D. Warner purchased 39 mortgages, totalling \$89,929.49 with accrued interest of \$954.55, making a total of \$100,884.04. This was placed to the credit of the bank in the amount of \$100,884.04. In order to obtain this money for the bank, Howard M. Warner and Harley D. Warner pledged their individual credits and stocks, as in no other way could the loan be made.

"This money was placed in the bank in April, 1931, to save it, as its condition at that time was becoming serious, owing to steady withdrawal for payment of taxes, living expenses and to cover individual losses of money of the depositors.

"Failure of the bank was due to inability to collect loans, depreciation of properties covered by mortgages and general non-liquid condition of its assets. Many of the bank's bonds were real estate obligations in which there was heavy depreciation, amounting to as much as sixty-six and two-thirds per cent.

"The books and records of the bank are in excellent condition and there are no defalcations or shortages on the part of any employee of the bank.

"We find no grievous fault with this bank. There is very little on the part of officers and directors of the bank to criticize and much to commend. The bank was built around the good name of Fred M. Warner and ever since his death his sons have made an honest and earnest effort to perpetuate that good name. In a time of stress and necessity they proved themselves worthy of their heritage by endangering their own individual future for the benefit of the depositors of the bank. They realized to a high degree this trust relationship between the officers of the bank and the depositors, and it is no fault of theirs that the bank failed. Established as it was in the center of an extraordinary and unsound real estate development, the bank expanded to meet the requirements of the community and when that development collapsed the bank of necessity went with it."
