It may easily have provided the margin by which he won.

Not much less does the appointment strengthen President Hoover in all other parts of the country, though for a different reason. The President's closest followers have always insisted that he is not a master, or even an ordinarily adeep politicap. To the contrary, he was put before the people in 1928 as not at all versed in political maneuvering. 
