COMMERCE BOARD BUYS NEW CHASSIS FOR FIRE TRUCK

Telephone Service For Emergency Fire Calls Obtained By Board

The Commerce Board has acquired new fire fighting equipment. Through the efforts of the Exchange club and the Township Board a new chassis has been purchased and the old equipment mounted on it. In addition to the present equipment and its two chemical tanks, the new truck will carry a hose reel and a 250-gallon booster tank.

With the exception of the larger cities the equipment is the best in the county and obtained at a much smaller cost.

Elmer McQuern will be retained as fire chief and the new apparatus will be stored in one of the three heated garages of the village, dividing the time of storage in equal periods throughout the year. The owner of the garage will be responsible for the upkeep of the equipment and will furnish a driver in case of fires.

On Saturday, March 12, H. J. Wettlaufer, Michigan Bell telephone manager of Pontiac, met with E. V. Metzger, Kenneth Ryel and three members of the Township Board, consisting of Joseph Loug, Erle and Lee Welch. The purpose of the meeting was to establish telephone service between Commerce telephone exchange and Walled Lake exchange to take care of emergency fire alarms.
