Fruit Growers To Get Largest Crop Loans

over three dollars per acre will be loaned on any farm for general farming, but up to \$12 an acre will be allowed for truck crops and potatoes, and up to \$25 for orchards.

The farmer is to give a note and a crop mortgage for the loan.

payable November 30, 1932, with interest at 5½ per cent. Applications must be in by April 30 to the local committee. In 1931 loans were made and the money available within 10 days, and it is expected that a similar record can be made this year.

R. J. Smith, South Lyon banker, is chairman of the county committee.

All applicants for crop loans

must have farmed in 1931.

Additional details of the loan plan are stated in a pamphlet issued by the Secretary of Agriculture. A copy is available at the Enterprise office. Any information contained in the pamphlet may be obtained by calling the Enterprise.
