

**A. FRANK HOLMES,
ILL A FEW DAYS,
DIES; RITES HELD**

Influenza Followed by Heart Attack Causes Death; Was 45 Years of Age

Another of the sudden deaths which have visited upon this community in recent months was that of Alfred Franklin "Frank" Holmes, who expired last Friday morning, and for whom funeral services were held Monday. He had been connected with various Farmington garages during the past few years.

Mr. Holmes had been ill but a few days. He collapsed at 2:30 a. m. Friday and died within a short time.

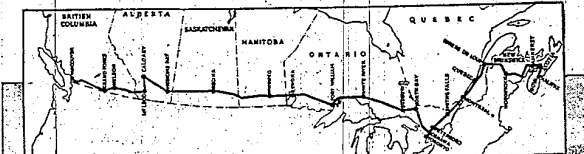
Alfred Franklin Holmes was born in Fergus Falls, Minn., August 1, 1886. He came to Michigan ten years ago married Mrs. Mae Lewin in 1925. To this union three sons were born, Alfred Franklin Jr., Cleve Marion and Gordon Robert.

Mr. Holmes at the time of his death was working in Detroit as salesman.

He was taken ill with influenza Sunday, March 20, and passed away after a heart attack early last Friday morning. He leaves besides his wife and children two brothers, Cleve and Lorenzo; a sister, Martha Kerr, and several nieces and nephews, all of whom live in North Dakota.

Funeral services were held Monday at the Heenev undertaking parlors, followed by burial at Oakwood. Rev. F. C. Johnson officiated.

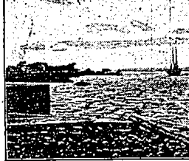
**Coast-to-Coast Telephone Line Spans

PHONE CONVERSATION NOW SPAN 3 OCEANS

Five years ago Michigan newspapers chronicled the first telephone conversation between Michigan and London, England. It marked an epoch in communication—conversation between people on opposite sides of the Atlantic had been made possible, and this service had been extended to Michigan less than a month after its practical demonstration by Bell System engineers.

February 12, 1927, marked the opening of transatlantic telephone service for Michigan telephone users. But so rapid has been the development of vocal communication over great distances that already the word "transatlantic" has been replaced by "transpacific." Voices of Michigan people have crossed not only the Atlantic, but also the Pacific and Indian oceans. And the science of telephone engineering continues to push back the horizon.
