

**Township Meeting Is Salary Slash Debate**

 sue with the remarks of Mr. Campbell, and declared that school teachers are taking cuts up to 50 per cent, with many seeking the jobs. He asserted that there were many who would take the township positions for less. His remarks were followed by applause. John Brunk then arose and said he had been assured the township officials were planning to take further reductions in salary, and that they could be depended upon. Applause followed these remarks also.

Mr. McCrumb then moved to lay on the table the motion under consideration: Justice Ernest Blanchard and Mr. Headerle were named as tellers, but the latter pointed out that he could not very well serve, inasmuch as he had made the original motion. Mr. Eagle was named in his place.

Voting was by raising hands, and 42 were counted in the affirmative, to lay on the table. Mr. Eagle declared that he was certain not all of the people understood the meaning of the vote, and that it should be explained. At this point Mrs. Elmer Goetz arose and declared that "if people can't understand such a simple motion as this, then they surely haven't the intelligence to set any salaries."

**Debate Checked**  
 Supervisor Coe explained the meaning of the motion, and voters were again called for, and the tellers reported 61 in the affirmative. Mr. Headerle then suggested that inasmuch as the meaning of the motion to lay on the table had been explained, he in fairness ought to be allowed to explain his. He said that the intent of his motion was not to keep the salaries stationary, or to raise them, but to allow the board to cut them as they see fit. Mr. Bullis arose to explain what he had in mind, but was cut off when Mr. McCracken rose to a point of order, on the ground that the motion before the house was not debatable. A woman attempted to speak was ruled out for the same reason. A suggestion to vote by ballot had no headway.

Negative votes were called for and resulted in a disagreement between the tellers. Mr. Eagle reported that he had counted 67, while Mr. Blanchard counted 69. Supervisor Coe declared the motion, to lay on the table, carried. Mr. Headerle then offered a motion to allow the board "to make such cuts as they see fit" in the salaries, but it was blocked when Mr. McCracken pointed out that the motion did not differ from the former one, which had just been laid on the table.

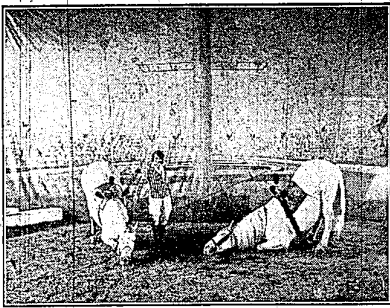
Mr. McCracken asked why the township board members would not state what they would do, and Mr. Coe said he was willing to take another 10 per cent cut, but also his work was more extensive than it had ever been, and invited anyone to visit him and become acquainted with the volume of work to be done. Mr. Headerle said he did not believe the salaries are equalized as they should be, that some should take a 10 per cent cut and others more, to which Mr. McCrumb declared himself agreed. Mr. Headerle went on to say that "the people here should not set the salaries—they are not on the job every day as the officials are and are not in as good a position to judge." Mr. Coe again invited "some of the people who want to cut the supervisor's salary one-half or two-thirds to visit me, especially Mondays or Thursdays."

Mr. McCracken then suggested that if the township board would say it would take cuts, and what they would be, he believed the matter could be adjusted to the satisfaction of everyone present. Mr. Coe stated that the law empowers the board to settle the supervisor's salary, so that in that respect at least, the action would be of no value.

**"Another Not-Debatable"**  
 Mr. McCracken arose and started to follow up his suggestion of coming to some agreement, but the device that proved so effective earlier in the meeting came to play again. Mr. McCracken had scarcely started to speak when Mr. Headerle shouted a motion to adjourn, and was quickly supported.

The motion, being not debatable, was put and carried by a loud verbal chorus of "yeas" and posed by a few shouts of "no," before the speaker could finish his sentence. It was some time before many of those in the room realized that the meeting was over. The session had gone several

minutes past the allotted time of one hour.

The Township election provided little excitement and drew little attention. The only contest, centering in a sticker candidacy for constable, resulted in victory for those whose names appeared on the ballot. The sticker candidate, Claude Wilson, polled a good vote, but failed by a substantial margin to win one of the four places as constable. He received 78 votes in Precinct No. 1 and 93 in Precinct No. 2, for a total of 171. He was 55 votes behind Dehanke, who totalled 226 votes, 119 in Precinct No. 1 and 107 in Precinct No. 2. William LaForge led with 255 votes, with William Gregor only four votes behind him, and Fred Menke third with 228.

All of the other nominees on the Republican ticket were elected without opposition. Their votes in each precinct and the totals were as follows:

 The condition of Earl Wolfe, who had a serious operation last week in Detroit, is reported much improved. It is considered he is quite certain to recover, unless complications set in.



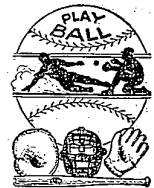
