WALLED LAKE NEWS

ACCIDENT VICTIM IS IDENTIFIED AS WALLED LAKE MAN

Funeral Services Held For Charles Johnson, Killed By Automobile

Charles Johnson of Walled Lake village proved to be the "identified man" fatally injured when hit by an automobile on Orchard Lake Road, between Walled Lake Road and Long Lake Road the evening of April 6.

His body was discovered by J. Fredericks of Birmingham. He had been hit by a car driven by Charles Norman Tanton, who left the scene of the accident with out giving aid to Mr. Johnson.

The driver's car swerved across the road and hit the guard rail. The driver was later picked up by Patrolman Milton of Orchard Lake police, and admitted hitting Johnson. He said that he tried to see the man walking along the road. Mr. Johnson was taken to the Pontiac General Hospital and died a few hours later without gaining consciousness.

Mr. Johnson was born in New Hudson and spent his entire life in Oakland County. He had been a resident of Walled Lake for the past 21 years. Surviving are a widow and a daughter, Mrs. Ward C. Sly of Lansing. The funeral was held on Saturday at the home with interment at the Walled Lake cemetery. Rev. A. K. Mac Rae officiated.

So when the sponsors of the spelling-bee wrote that she was soon to receive a silver medal, Elsen wrote back that she was not entitled to it. The reply came that she must have been mistaken, and she wrote again, saying that she still was certain she was not a "runner-up." Once again a reply came, insisting that the records showed her as one of the 15 second-place winners, but after another letter her version of it was reluctantly accepted, although by that time the medals, cast in Europe, had long since been ordered, and the ultimate decision left an extra one.

Elsena has one medal, however, a bronze one for the district championship last year. Winning of the school championship this year brought her second atlas, and she has won three dictionaries for grade championships. She is studying diligently for the approaching district meeting, in the hope of adding at least one, and possibly more, medals to her collection.
