Miss Weaver had a position with an Electrical Engineering Company, as private secretary.

Miss Weaver was a charming bride in an Alice Blue silk crepe gown of a Patou model, with blue angel skin lace trimming, a long coat of the new Nassau blue wool, and an Ermine fur collar a smart hat of spider web straw braid of a matching shade, blue Colonial pumps, and blue accessories completed her pretty costume.
