Record is kept of each citizen's voling, and if a citizen does not vote for two years, his resignation is cancelled and he must reregister before he can vote again.

The registration cards provide for an unusually complete record of each voter, including a detail-ed account of removals from one voting place to another from the time of the first registration in the Township. The new system will add con-siderably to the work of the completeness of check-up on every voter, and particularly during the next three months when the entire Township must will be real-ized, in bringing and keeping up to date of the registration books and encouraging greater interest in voting on the part of citizens.
