### THE SCHOOL PROBLEM

(From the "Daily Tribune," Royal Oak, Michigan, February 20, 1932)  
To the Editor:

May I suggest a program for our harassed school board? In the first place there are two things upon which I think the people of Royal Oak should insist:

- In justice to the generation which is now going to school, we must oppose any attempt to lower the standards of education or to restrict the curriculum in any way. The full school year and all the present school facilities should be maintained at all costs. The adults, not the children, are to blame for the present condition. The children should not be made to pay for the political incompetence of their elders.
- The salaries of our teachers must not be cut. This is a matter not only of justice to the teachers but of sound public policy. It is imperative at this time to maintain American wage standards. Wage cuts for public employees will inevitably be followed by further wage cuts for all of us. Low wages mean less buying power which in turn means fewer jobs which in turn means a longer and more bitter depression. In justice not only to the teachers but to ourselves, we must fight any plan to cut the pay of teachers and other public employees.

With these ends in view I wish to suggest as a very reasonable program, the following:

- The school board should declare a two-year moratorium on interest and sinking fund payments.
- During this two year reprieve we should insist that the state legislature provide for additional school districts from the state.

About one-third of the money that we raise for school purposes, I understand, goes to the bondholders. So far the bondholders have been extremely lucky, considering the times. They have received interest on their investment regularly. On the other hand many of those who complainingly pay taxes to support our schools are no longer receiving interest on their savings and will consider themselves very lucky if they can recover a fraction of the principal. It seems to be unreasonable to expect us to bleed ourselves white in order to fatten some bondholders.

A moratorium on payments on the bonded indebtedness would give us a respite of two years during which our school system could operate at full efficiency. In the meantime we should see to it that the state legislature takes some action in the matter. For instance, the road building program could be suspended for several years and the money diverted to school purposes. At any rate, the state should help, because the state could find ways of shifting the burden of taxation to those who are better able to bear it than the average home-owner. A state income tax on the larger incomes would do that. According to a recent report, the wealth of the country has increased during the present depression. But the wealth seems to have been pretty well drained away from some school districts. The thing to do is to go after it and bring some of it back. Only the state or the national government can do that.

### Protest Against New Schedule For Buses

the City Commission Monday night against the company's action in altering the schedule without notice or sanction from the authorities.

Itney Proposed

An offer of a jitney line was made by Frank Reuland, 19615 Coventry, Detroit, who said he would run for a 10-cent fare to Five Points. He would use seven-passenger automobiles. His suggestion of a 15-minute service somewhat surprised the City officials, as it is considered that much less frequent service is required. Mr. Reuland said that he has had experience in the transportation business, and that he had tried to get a franchise three years ago on Grand River, when the trolley-cars were running.

In the protests against the new schedule it was pointed out that men going to work are seriously handicapped, and that the schedule now in effect is of no value whatever to men working at the Ford Plant at River Rouge, of whom there are many between Farmington and Five Points.

For men on any of the three shifts, the nearest bus to the time for going to work would make them late, while taking the next earlier bus would mean long waiting at the plant. The first bus in the morning, leaving Farmington at 6:30 a. m., would not bring the men to the plant in time for work at 7:30 o'clock. In the afternoon, there is no bus between 1:16 and 3:16, the latter of which would also bring the men to work too late. A 2:19 through bus is shown on the schedule, but runs only on Saturdays, Sunday and holidays.

### Asks Resolution

In protesting against the schedule, W. Allen Nelson asked the Commission to pass two resolutions, one requesting the Michigan Public Utilities Commission to cancel whatever might exist in the way of a franchise to the Eastern Michigan Motorbuses, and another directed to justices of the peace in this section. The law prohibits anyone from carrying passengers for hire, but men going to work are being forced to violate the law. Their only means of transportation is for arranging to ride with fellow-workmen who have automobiles, and who will carry them each day for an agreed-upon price, since the car owners would not be expected to carry other workmen free. The requested resolution would ask the judge or judges to overrule these State law violations as unavoidable.

Mayor Lamb said he believed that more could be accomplished by personal contact than by resolution, and said he would seek the aid of Representative Melvin Lee and others at Lansing, in appealing to the Michigan Public Utilities Commission. The appeal will be made in the near future.
