of institutions of this kind, that the business of a Board of Trustees should be that of policy and legislation, leaving the execution of the policies entirely to the superintendent." Hiring of a business manager in place of the present bookkeeper is then recommended, after which the following statement is made: "It is the further recommendation of this committee that the Board of Trustees act more in an advisory capacity instead of paying so much attention to the details of the running of the institution; and if they do not care to follow the recommendation herein given, that they be asked to resign."

The report then concludes with the suggestion that an effort be made to find some use for the children's unit, built several years ago, which cost the County over \$175,000, but which has never been furnished because the County ran short of funds, and which could not be operated now if furnished, because the County could not stand the expense.

Mayor Lamb was reported Thursday morning in the press as not having signed the committee's report "because it did not make recommendations adequate to correct the condition at the sanatorium." Mr. Lamb told the Enterprise that he had not made or authorized a statement to that effect, but that it did represent his views on the matter.

William A. Ewart, Pontiac city attorney who offered the resolution in the board of supervisors which instituted the investigation, also refused to sign the report of the committee, of which he was a member. His refusal was reported as being for two different reasons, one being the same as that of Mayor Lamb, and the other that he had not been able to attend enough meetings of the committee to permit him to be sufficiently well-informed to sign the report.

Mr. Warner said Thursday that he was waiting to study the complete report before making extended comment. He said, however,

that the trouble at the sanatorium all began with the salary cuts, and that none of the difficulties would have developed had the trustees been content to let expenses go on untouched. As to the "lack of diplomacy" cited, he said he believed that "there is really no diplomatic way to cut salaries,—they're just cut, that's all." Referring to the former head surgeon, he said that the latter had been informed by the trustees that they would have to reduce his salary from \$5,000 to \$3,000. "The man then came to us and told us that he couldn't work for \$3,000, that if he couldn't have his \$5,000 salary, he would quit," said Mr. Werner. "What could anyone do?"

Mr. Werner said that what he had seen of the report gave him the impression that its various parts were rather inconsistent with one another. He said that although the report stated that the trustees "pay too much attention to details," the trustees are at the sanatorium only twice a month and then only a few hours each time.

In regard to the hiring of a business manager, Mr. Warner said that he would resign rather than vote for such a move. All of the checks are issued and most of the financial work for the sanatorium is handled by the Board of Auditors, he stated, declaring that a business manager is not needed, and the extra salary that would have to be paid to engage a capable one would be a sheer waste of taxpayers' money. The bookkeeper now is not overworked, Mr. Warner said. The bookkeeper's salary is \$1,800. Mr. Warner referred to troubles that had been experienced previously with business managers at the institution, one being now in prison for embezzlement, and another of whom was forced to resign due to trouble with his accounts.

The committee's report was received and filed by the supervisors without discussion. The inquiry lasted for a number of weeks, and more than 50 witnesses were called.
