

# Harrison Wins First Loop Crown

Farmington Harrison climaxed its second year of football with a 35-0 win over Walled Lake Western, and the Western Six Suburban championship.

Harrison captured the league title with a 4-0 record, ahead of defending champion Waterford Mott at 3-1. Mott closed out its season with a 31-6 triumph over Northville. Harrison topped Mott a week ago 13-0.

"This has been a very rewarding season for us," said Harrison Coach John Herrington. "We lost seven starters before the season even started but our juniors have really produced."

"Our starting quarterback, Rick Hughes, moved to Colorado right before the season," added Herrington. "He is the third leading scorer in Colorado prep ball this year."

"We have come a long way

this year and in the last three games our defense has been given up only one touchdown."

**AGAINST WALLED LAKE.** Harrison converted four pass interceptions into Hawk touchdowns.

John Kild gave Harrison a 6-0 lead in the first quarter with a 20 yard pass interception return.

Early in the second quarter Dave Manos picked off a Walled Lake pass for Harrison on the Western 30. Chris

Pagnucco threw his first of two second quarter TD passes to Craig Perkins on a 25 yard play. Manos passed to Dennis Thibodeau for a two-pointer and Harrison led 14-0.

Midway through the quarter, Harrison's Dave Norton intercepted a Western pass on its 35 and returned to the 20. After being pushed back Pagnucco connected with Perkins again for a 29 yard touchdown. Manos ran a two-point play and the Hawks were up 22-0.

**MANOS TALLIED** two touchdowns in the third quarter to conclude the Harrison scoring attack. He intercepted a pass and returned it 75 yards for a TD with Sam Fink converting, and climaxed a 42 yard drive with a nine yard sprint and converted a two-point play.

Walled Lake's deepest penetration was to the Western 23 late in the third quarter.

# Grid Ratings

Southfield Lathrup rolled to its 15th straight win in a 49-6 rout over Waterford and holds a slight edge over undefeated Brother Rice for the No. 1 spot in the Observerland prep grid ratings.

Lathrup successfully defended its Inter-Lakes championship with a 5-0 record while Rice clinched at least a tie for the Catholic Central Division title in a 30-6 conquest over Catholic Central.

Redford Union dropped its first game of the season in a 15-8 heartbreaker to Allen Park. The Panthers, now 6-1, slipped to the No. 3 spot.

Defending state champions, North Farmington, captured the Northwest Suburban Conference with a 22-8 win over Thurston; dropping the Eagles to the No. 9 spot. The Raiders stand 6-1 with the Oak Park loss sticking out like a sore thumb.

Garden City West clinched at least a tie in the Tri-River league by overpowering Cherry Hill 44-20, and Franklin held onto the No. 6 spot with an impressive 35-0 show over Birmingham Groves.

Borgess shut out Gabriel Richard 28-0 for its sixth victory and Garden City East slipped ahead of Thurston with a 34-0 win over Lutheran West. East is tied with Wayne for the league lead entering the final week of play.

Farmington Harrison moved into the No. 10 spot, knocking out St. Agatha which lost to St. Thomas. Harrison won the Western Six crown with a 35-0 win over Walled Lake Western.

After suffering their third shutout at the hands of the Suburban Eight's trio of major powers, Plymouth's Rocks will close out their league schedule Friday in quest of a second division victory over Livonia Bentley. Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m. on the Bulldog gridiron.

Edsel Ford was the latest to whitewash the Rocks, spelling Plymouth's opening of its new stadium with a 22-0 pasting which saw quarterback Mike Booth steal the go-found show as he had a hand in all 22 points.

**BOOTH RAN** 16 yards for the first Edsel Ford score, passed two yards to Randy Owen for the second and then pitched six yards to Ralph Plummer for the third as their league schedule Friday in quest of a second division victory over Livonia Bentley. Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m. on the Bulldog gridiron.

The fifty quarterback personally accounted for more than 170 yards on running plays, including sprints of 50 and 71 yards, as he was instrumental in boosting Edsel Ford's league record to 4-1-1 and dropping Plymouth to a 2-4-0 mark.
