Lamb Answers Charges Of Poor Commissioners

interested in being paid by the county for the services performed, that it is inconceivable to him that three men might be public spirited enough to attempt to work out this very different problem and save the taxpayers money, without in some way being compensated.

"During 1931 there was an average number of families receiving relief of 4,355. During the period from November 1931 to May 1932 inclusive, the average number of families jumped to 4,806. During 1931 the average weekly cost per family was \$7.27, and during the seven months period from November 1931 to May 1932, the average weekly cost of relief for family of the 4,806 families was \$3.25. As the administration of poor relief under the old method was growing increasingly worse, it is reasonable to assume that the best they could have done would have been to have had \$7.27 cost per family per week. Therefore if they had had 4,806 families to care for during that period the cost to the county would have been \$1,048,762 as compared to the actual cost of \$163,239.38. The difference of \$879,528.72 between these two amounts represents the minimum amount due to the taxpayers of Oakland County by the seven months administration of the present poor Commission."

The controversy was closed for the present after a long afternoon, when the supervisors adjourned subject to call of the chair. A special order of business was intended for appointment of new poor commissioners, because it was stated that two of the commissioners had moved from the County. Investigation showed, however, that they still reside in Oakland, and no action was taken.

Unless something occurs to alter present plans, the County will go back to each local unit handling its own poor relief on January 1, 1933. The supervisors held a two-thirds vote which was required to alter it. A number of supervisors interviewed, said that there is no question that the former system will be reinstated, and that not only would it be impossible to get a two-thirds majority to revoke the action of last fall, but rather that a majority is still in favor of return to the previous method.
