NEWS FROM DETROIT TO FARMINGTON IN 12 HOURS—RECORD 50 YEARS AGO

The great political conventions and occurrence of independence Day stored memories of long ago in the mind of Nathan H. Power Farmington's wide 61-year-old Michigan, and from recollections of those bygone years he draws many striking comparisons of the times of today with those of yesterday, in the following article: One of the events that are sure to make interesting news to the proceedings of the great political parties in their national conventions. In the early years of our country, days would elapse, and sometimes, weeks would go by before the name of the presidential candidates would be known in the remote parts of the United States. What a wonderful change the radio has effected in the dissemination of news! In the civilized world; I am reminded of this by an incident that startled the citizens of our country at the time of its occurrence many years ago. James A. Garfield was elected President of the United States in 1880. He had had a distinguished career, a gallant soldier in the civil war in which he went from the ranks to the position of Major General. At the close of the war, he was elected to Congress, became the acknowledged leader of his party in the house of Representatives, and was elected to the Republican National Convention at Chicago in June 1880, and while acting in that capacity was made the nominee of the Convention, the only instance of our country where one of the delegates to a convention was named for the greatest gift at its command, the presidential nomination. Elected after a spirited campaign, he was inaugurated on the 4th of March 1881. He had the confidence of the country with every promise of a successful administration. But it was not to be. On the second day of July he started to visit Williams College where his eldest son was to graduate. Accompanied by this close friend, James G. Blaine, he was in the city of O depot in Washington when Charles J. Guiteau drew a gun and shot the President three
