ing by a magician's trick that none could fathom, escaping from a securely fastened iron chest. He permitted himself to be imprisoned. He has perfected the trick after months of effort.

In his talk Mr. Salowich said:

"When the flower of American manhood went to war it returned and handed itself into the greatest organization of the world, and called itself the American Legion. Who and what is the Legion? We are glad to align ourselves into one mass as an army of men who join together to do the things that our ancestors did in the days of heroic trials and struggles. In that service we came upon comradeship, for not only men march and sacrifice together but they come to an appreciation of each others worth. Through rough endeavor we won that spirit of comradeship and service; and having won it we shall never give it up. It is by virtue of this comradeship of regard of one for the other, that there can be no forgetfulness for us of those of our comrades who have fallen in the path of duty. It is this comradeship that comes upon the return. Those who are still suffering; those who need hospitalization; those 30,000 young comrades who were taken from their homes and left with their lives just budding into fruitful labor and achievement; boys of America, with eager eyes and a song on their lips, but who are unable to do their part in the service of the Republic.

"We have learned to preserve the memories and incidents of our association of the great war. Because these boys came back with their bodies shattered, their minds shadowed by strange horrors, brought back blinded and silent, for them we shall continually stand guard, and maintain a rigid vigilance for fifty years. We need to help all we can until the Nation's debt to the disabled is paid in full. It is our privilege to serve our fellow comrades; and we of the Legion are constantly doing it."

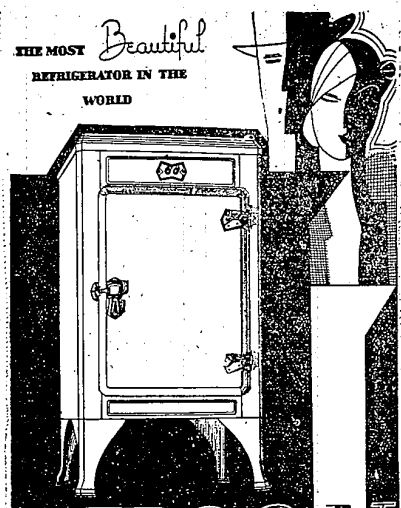
