## HOW THE BEVERLY GIRLS CARRIED ON

THE exterior of the Beverly mansion was one of solid brick, red brick, Georgian, with a beautiful example of fan-light over the white doorway and a side garden that was walled in by red brick over the closed carriage and the height of a man.
