For Circuit Court Commissioner

Earl L. Phillips, of Pontiac has filed with the County Clerk nominating petitions as candidate for the office of Circuit Court Commissioner in Oakland County, at the Republican Primary to be held September 13.

Mr. Phillips was born in Marlette, Township, Sanilac County,



Michigan, and received his early education in the rural schools of that community and high school education in Marlette. Thereafter, he taught in the public schools of Lapeer County until he entered the Literary Department of the University of Michigan in 1912. He afterwards took up the study of law in the law department in the same University, where he

graduated in 1916. In 1917, Mr. Phillips entered the United States Army where he served until after the close of the World War. He then located in Pontiac and established himself in the practice of law, which profession he has followed ever since. Mr. Phillips is now serving his second term as Circuit Court Commissioner of Oakland County. Fraternally, Mr. Phillips is a member of F. & A. M. Pontiac Lodge No. 21, B. P. O. E. No. 819, Pontiac Lodge No. 19 K. of P. Lions Club of Pontiac, and Cook-Nelson Post of the American Legion. He is a member of Central Methodist Church of Pontiac. Mr. Phillips is married and lives on Cherokee Road, Pontiac.

In announcing his candidacy, Mr. Phillips says: "I have always recognized the right of Southern Oakland County to one of the two Circuit Court Commissioner Offices. I shall expect the voters of Southern Oakland County to support their candidate for one of the two offices, and shall appreciate their support for the other office."
