## Report Of Annual Meeting And Statement Of Receipts And Disbursements for the year Ending June 30, 1932

The annual meeting was held in the William Grace School July 11, 1932. The meeting was called to order by the President about 8:25 p. m. Minutes of the previous annual meeting were read by the Secretary. Motion made by Mr. Werchin, seconded by Ray Oldham that the minutes be accepted as read was carried. The report of the Treasurer was then read. Motion made by Mr. Byers, seconded by Mr. Werchin that the Treasurer's report be accepted as read was carried. Mr. Shulkins, Mr. Kerr, Mr. Reniff and Mr. Hoffman were appointed tellers. Mrs. Schoenberger was nominated by Mr. Werchin seconded by Mr. Shulkins for the position of Trustee. Mr. Reniff was then nominated by Mr. C. Noble, seconded by Mr. Hoffman, upon receiving nomination Mr. Reniff was released from the position of teller, on a point of order and Mr. Cox was appointed in his place. The ballots were then cast. Of the total of 66 Mrs. Schoenberger received 35 Mr. Reniff 33 and 1 ballot was spoiled. Mrs. Schoenberger was re-elected to the Board. Motion made by Mr. Kerr, seconded by Mr. Hoffman that length of school term for the coming year be nine months was carried. Motion made by Mr. Werchin, seconded by Mr. Shulkins that full tuition be paid for the High School pupils for the coming year was carried. A resolution with respect to the voted tax for the coming year was introduced by Mrs. McCullough. Motion made by Mr. Kerr, seconded by Mr. Lawton that the amount of \$8,000 as recommended by Mrs. McCullough be adopted. This resolution as offered was defeated the final vote being by ballot, which was supervised by the above named tellers. Total votes 63. No 31. Motion made by Mrs. Schoenberger, seconded by Mr. Byers to adjourn was carried. Meeting adjourned about 10:40 p. m.
