"The American girl operator," he says, "adopts a much more familiar and easy attitude toward the subscriber, which certainly would not be encouraged by the British Postoffice." MISS LUTE HOYT OF WALLED LAKE, DIES WEDNESDAY

Was Oldest Resident Who Was Born And Lived At Walled Lake

Funeral services for Miss Lute Hoyt, Walled Lake pioneer, who passed away Wednesday morning at her home after an illness of nine and one half months, will be held at 2:30 o'clock, Saturday afternoon, in the Walled Lake Baptist Church, Reverend A. K. MacRae will be in charge of the ceremonies. Burial will take place at the Walled Lake Cemetery.

Miss Hoyt was born in Walled Lake on January 28, 1856 and has lived there during her entire life. She was the oldest person who was born and was living in the town.

She was the daughter of Dr. James M. Hoyt and Margaret Barrett, both first settlers of this district. Dr. Hoyt was a practicing physician in Walled Lake and also kept a store in the town. Miss Hoyt was the last of ten children.

She studied to be a teacher at Ypsilanti and taught school at Commerce and in the "Home of the Friendless" in Detroit.

Miss Hoyt was active in Baptist Church affairs, being elected to the office of Church Clerk 43 consecutive times.

Surviving her are 10 nephews and nieces.
