VOTERS ATTENTION

There seems to be some doubt in regard to the New Registration Law. All citizens who have voted at previous elections in the City of Farmington are not required to re-register this year. The new law applies only to cities of 5000 inhabitants or over or to such cities and towns as choose to operate under its provisions. Because of the expense necessary to put the new law in force, the city commissioners chose to operate under the old law.

ANNUAL REPORT OF SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 5, FRACTIONAL TOWNSHIPS OF FARMINGTON, LIVONIA AND REDFORD

JUNE 30, 1931 TO JUNE 30, 1932

Annual meeting of District No. 5 Fr. Township of Farmington, Livonia and Redford held on the 11th day of July 1932.

Present: President Headlee, Utujian, Doheny, Sauve and about 60 voters. Lahr absent. Minutes of last annual meeting were read and approved. Report of 1931-1932 read. All voters received a mimeograph copy.

Election of trustees, two to be elected. Tellers: Mr. H. Earle and Mr. D. Kendall.

Mr. C. Heise nominated Mr. Doheny, supported by Mr. J. Chapman. W. Laforgue nominated Mrs. Billing, supported by W. T. Roberts. H. Bradley nominated Joe Grace, supported by Wm. Thornton.

Motion by Mr. Weston, supported by Mr. Earle that nominations be closed. Ballots cast: Mr. Doheny 41; Mr. Grace 7; Mrs. Billing 12. Total 60. Mr. Doheny declared elected.

Mr. A. Stoltz nominated Mr. H. Sauve, supported by Mr. Earle. Mr. J. Roberts nominated Mrs. Billing, supported by Mrs. Laforgue. Motion by Mr. Laforgue, supported by Mrs. Menke, that nominations be closed. Ballots cast: Mr. H. Sauve 40; Mrs. Billing 20; Total 60. Mr. H. Sauve declared elected.

Officers Salaries: Motion by Willis Roberts, supported by Wm. Thornton that the board members' salaries be set by the board themselves. Carried.

Motion by Mrs. Billing, supported by James Roberts, that length of school term should be determined by the board. Carried. Motion by Mrs. Billing, supported by Mr. Earle, that text books be furnished free. Carried.

Motion by Joe Grace, supported by Willis Roberts that school District No. 5 Frac. pay just amount of tuition money required by law, \$60.00. Motion by Mr. Utujian, supported by Mrs. Menke that we vote by ballot on the above motion. Yes or No. Yes 37. No 16. Motion carried.

Motion by Mr. Billing, supported by Mr. Laforgue that depository remain the same. Carried.

Motion by C. Heise, supported by H. Hinborne that 8:00 p. m. will be the time set for the next annual meeting. Carried.

Motion by Mr. George Nacker, supported by Mr. Earle that the meeting adjourn.
