Lawson For Legislation Favorable To District

James E. Lawson, Candidate for State Senator, says:

"In announcing myself as a candidate for the second term in the State Senate, I desire to make this statement. In the eight years that I have served in the House and Senate, no legislation known to me as detrimental to my district has ever been passed and all important legislation sponsored by me has been passed. All legislation serving the best interests of my district, no matter by whom initiated, has had my support and most of it has been enacted into law.

"The securing of good legislation saving the taxpayer of bad legislation for your people is not done so much through public utterance and paper statements as it is by personal work with the various members of the legislature. This I am able to do because of my association with the members of the legislature for several sessions, knowing over seventy-five per cent of them intimately.

"During the special session in which my district's interests were so vitally concerned, I took a firm stand in insisting that the entire weight tax be returned to the counties. As the bill was originally drafted, the \$2,500,000 in 1933 to \$4,000,000 in 1935 for township roads was to be taken out of the weight tax. I fought most earnestly to have this money taken out of the gas tax and won the fight. Through this action, my county and district will receive hundreds of thousands of dollars more than under the bill as first drafted, and that much more will go to relief of Covert Road taxes.

"I take full credit for putting through this great saving to the taxpayers of my district.

"I wish to call the attention of my people to the fact that I was one of the members of the Legislature to insist on \$5,500,000 being cut from the budget. I am convinced that another \$5,000,000 can be eliminated and I shall earnestly work to bring this about.

"As a member of the Committee on Banks, I was active in making it possible for 85% of the depositors to get into agreements for continuance of the banks threatened with failure, and thereby enable them in time to secure the major portion of their savings. As a result of this simple act, to date some twenty banks have been again able to open their doors. I am of the opinion that other vital banking legislation should be enacted to the end that the savings of depositors be guaranteed. Now that the National government has recognized this problem through the creation of Home Loan Banks, I further pledge myself to sponsor and support measures that will provide absolute safety to depositors and return to them the largest possible amount of the hard earned money that they may now have in closed banks.

"For years I have recognized that the valuation placed upon Oakland County property was beyond sense and reason. I have time and again pleaded with the State Tax Commission to recognize this injustice. This year we are not only receiving nearly a \$100,000,000 reduction, but it is a greater percentage of reduction than any other county in the State. There is too much talk and claptrap about high-sounding methods of reducing the tax burden. My plan to reduce taxes is to reduce expenditures. Public officials must discourage bond issues for years to come. The people have more improvements now than they can pay for.

"Having at all times the interests of the voters at heart, I desire to have my colleagues in the

"To the extent that people feel that I have at all times in the past presented to them honestly, faithfully and earnestly and to the extent that they desire unselfish service, I solicit and shall deeply appreciate their support."

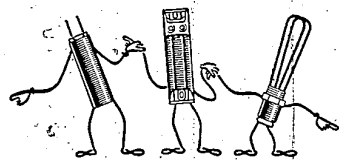
