To the Qualified Electors of the City of Farmington, State of Michigan:

Notice is hereby given that a General Primary Election will be held in said City on

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 13, 1932 AT THE TOWN HALL

For the purpose of placing in nomination by all political parties participating therein, candidates for the following offices, viz: STATE—One candidate for Governor; one candidate for Lieutenant Governor.

CONGRESSIONAL—One candidate for Representative in Congress for the Congressional district of which said City forms a part.

LEGISLATIVE—One candidate for Senator in the State Legislature of which said City forms a part. One candidate for Representative in the State Legislature for the Legislative district of which said City forms a part.

COUNTY—Also candidates for the following offices, viz: Judge of Probate, Prosecuting Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk, County Treasurer, Registrar of Deeds, Circuit Court Commissioner, Drain Commissioner, Coroners, Surveyor, County Road Commissioner.

Delegates to County Conventions There shall also be elected as many delegates to the County Convention as the several precincts as said ward, precinct or district is entitled to under the call of the county committees of said political parties, which number will be indicated by the number of blank lines printed on the official primary ballots used at said election, under the heading "Delegates to County Conventions."

The Board of Primary Election Inspectors shall certify to the County Clerk the names of the electors so elected as delegates, naming the political party upon whose ballots such electors were elected. The County Clerk shall notify by mail each person elected as such delegate, and shall certify to the chairman of the committee of each political party of the county, the delegates elected by such political party as delegates to the fall and succeeding spring county convention.

The name of the candidate for delegate to the county convention shall not be printed upon the official primary election ballot, but one or more such names may be placed on such ballot by printed or written slips pasted thereon by the voter, or the names may be written in by the voter.

Suggestions Relative To Voting Separate Ballots for each political party will be provided. The elector must name the political party of his choice when asking for a ballot and in marking his ballot must make a cross in the square to the left of the name of each candidate for whom he desires to vote, and can vote for only one candidate.

After the ballot is prepared it should be folded so that the initials of the inspector below the perforated corner will be on the outside.
