Farmington Remains A G. O. P. Stronghold

(Continued from page one) Jan 1. He received nearly half the total vote of the three precincts, 329 out of 741. William A. Comstock was the overwhelming choice of the Democrats, getting 180 out of 220 Democratic ballots for governor. O'Brien received 25 and Carney 15. Lieut.-Gov. Dickinson carried the three precincts by a wide margin, getting 373 to 205 for Sink and 70 for Fitch. Big Vote For Schulte Farmington gave its local aspirant for the Republican congressional nomination, John J. Schulte a notable margin over the other candidates. He carried all three precincts, getting nearly half the votes. His total was 302 out of 743 Farmington City gave him 109 votes out of 264; in Precinct No. 1 he received 102 out of 276, and in Precinct 2, he was given 91 out of 203. A big vote in Precinct No. 2 gave Roy Burgess of Redford second place with 128, Robert G. Yerkes of Northville third with 106, and George Dondero of Royal Oak fourth with 101. Clyde V. Fenner of Detroit, runner-up to Mayor Mitchell of Pontiac for Democratic nomination, captured most of the Democratic votes in the three Farmington precincts, getting 52, M. J. Murphy of Northville being a close second, with 45. Mitchell did not fare very well with Farmington voters, getting only 18 votes. Ahead of him were Charles P. Webster with 26 and Miss Mary Brumfield with 23. Moore Leads Andrew Moore carried this area for Republican nomination for State Senator by a comfortable margin, having 360 votes to 281 for Senator James E. Lawson, and 32 for Road. He carried the City and Precinct No. 1, but Lawson carried Precinct No. 2. Dawson, Democrat, beat his opponent, Wm. F. Dohany, 104 to 92. Norman C. Orr was a strong favorite in the combined totals of the precincts for Republican nomination for prosecutor, leading Smith 412 to 288. Orr carried all three voting places, the city by the narrow margin of 124 to 120, but Precinct No. 1 gave him a good

lead and in Precinct No. 2 it was more than two to one. Arthur P. Bogue, Democratic nominee for prosecutor ran behind Franklin E. Morris, the runner-up, carrying the City 22 to 20, but dropping behind in both Township precincts. Close Contest The tight race in the County of Frank J. Greenan and Roy Reynolds for the Republican nomination for sheriff was reflected in Farmington. Reynolds had the highest total, 256 to 246, Greenan carrying the City by a wide margin to cut down Reynolds' advantage in the other two voting-places. Pack received 186, Koehler 43 and Judy 26. Lynn D. Allen, who defeated Burton P. Daugherty for the Republican nomination for County clerk, in Farmington ran somewhat behind Daugherty. His total was 261 to 386 for Daugherty. Brady was the first choice of Democrats, with 97 votes. Schrader was a heavy favorite of the Democrats, getting nearly as many as the other three combined; his total was 103, Schrader having 55, Sesterlin 27 and Perry 25. Schrader's margin was especially large in Precinct 2, where he received 64 votes against 31 for all the other three combined. Albert W. Willson in Farmington ran ahead of Charles Sparks, who defeated him in the County for the nomination for treasurer. Willson led in every precinct by a comfortable margin. Corrigan led Schlegel for the Democratic nomination, 118 to 64. Miss Bronrdige Ahead Miss Mabel Bronrdige, register of deeds, continues popular with votes in the area to 228 for Curtis and 92 for Ruby. Curtis carried one precinct, No. 2, while Miss Bronrdige won the other two. George Westbrooks was the leader for the Democratic nomination for register of deeds, getting 55 to 43 for Thompson and 41 for Miss Florence Macintosh. Harry J. Merritt and Earl Phillips were heavy favorites of Farmington Republicans for circuit court commissioner. Merritt led with 331 in the total of the three precincts, Phillips being close behind with 314. McDonald was third with 131. Hampton fourth with 129, and Storz fifth with 83. The three precincts voted quite uniformly, Merritt being a bit

ahead of Phillips in the two township precincts and Phillips leading him in the City by 13 ballots. Holman and Holmes were the Democratic choices, running slightly ahead of Porritt, who eventually tossed out Holmes for the second place nomination in the County. Ransom Favored The Republican nominee for drain commissioner, William Ransom, was given a substantial margin over Charles R. Hauke by Farmington voters; Murray D. VanWagoner, incumbent Democrat, just nosed out Eugene Douglas, 102 to 100. Van Wagoner lost both township precincts, but a good margin in the city gave him his slight advantage. Kimball, Voorhees, Bell Local effort for G. Dewey Kimball had its effect, as two years ago, giving him a big majority for the Republican nomination for coroner, but J. Lee Voorhees, as always, ran strong in this vicinity, with Donald S. Bell, a newcomer, a strong third. Garnet M. Sparks was a close fourth, with Harbin, who made no campaign. Last Kimball's total was 433, with 250 for Voorhees, 175 for Bell, 144 for Sparks, and 38 for Harbin. Kimball's boost came in the city, where most voters quite apparently marked their tickets for only one of the candidates. He received 205, while the others, combined total was 187. In the township precincts, however, Voorhees was right up behind him, getting 114 in Precinct 1 to 132 for Kimball, and 92 in Precinct No. 2 as compared with Kimball's 96. Bell ran next to Voorhees in all three precincts. There was no Democratic contest. Dewitt and Faulk having no opposition. Farmington City was the first voting-place outside of Pontiac to reach the County seat with their reports. Results of most contests were known to spectators within two hours after the polls closed, in spite of the long ballots. The township precincts were also early, being among the first out-county districts to report. A number of residents, nearly all young men of the community, benefited by the election, having obtained a day's work aiding the causes of the candidates, passing out cards, etc. Most voters had no fewer than a dozen cards and folders thrust in their hands as they approached the polls.
