During the closing hours of the Primary Campaign, some one was responsible for the circulation of a hand bill attacking me and charging that I had presented to the Board of Supervisors of this County a bill for \$6000.00 for services rendered to the Townships of Avon, Bloomfield and Waterford in their recent fight with the State Tax Commission.

I had no opportunity to answer the charge before election as it was handed out the night before the election and on election day.

However, the Supervisors of the three Townships have answered it. The County Clerk has answered it in a sworn affidavit and the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors has concurred in the County Clerk's statement.

In view of the unwarranted and unjustifiable attack on me, the local paper was very glad to carry it purely as a matter of news.

I think everyone is interested in maintaining clean politics and I do not believe that any one countenances the kind of dirty politics, which was resorted to in the last moment of the campaign, especially when the statement was a deliberate falsehood and one which the Detroit Free Press, who carried the first story, had made a complete denial of in their paper of September 9th.

Mr. Hayne is a graduate of Kalamazoo College and of the University of Chicago, and has held pastorates in both Michigan and Utah.
