CIRCUIT COURT
COMMISSIONER'S
WORK IMPORTANT

Interest in all public affairs is keener than usual this year, as in all presidential election years, but a number of public-spirited Oakland County citizens are making a special effort to focus attention for the coming election on one of the least conspicuous, but nevertheless one of the most important offices in the County. The office is that of circuit court commissioner, one seldom in the public eye, but one which handles matters of the greatest moment to large numbers of citizens.

The circuit court commissioner is an officer of the circuit court, as the name implies. His work is to act in the place of the circuit judges, handling matters which ordinarily do not need to go thru the formality of a circuit trial, with judge, jury etc. If all these cases had to come before the circuit judges, they would be hopelessly swamped with work and the docket would be so crowded that delay would be almost endless. The circuit court commissioners, of which there are two in Oakland County, handle cases involving ownership and possession of land. However, the amount and the problems before them often involve as much as do cases before the circuit judges themselves.

Because the office is one of this nature, men and women in various parts of the County are active in urging the continuance as a circuit court commissioner of Earl L. Phillips of Pontiac. Although he is serving in his first public office, Mr. Phillips, they point out, has shown to an exceptional degree the sound judgment, the thorough legal experience and the high integrity which the position demands.

His standing as an attorney and as a public official is of the highest.

Mr. Phillips is one of the best-known members of the Oakland County bar, having been a practicing attorney in Pontiac for 15 years. He is a Republican.

BRIDGE OF ONE SPAN IN OAKLAND COUNTY FBI OF 63-11-2 CONTRAS 7 and 8 F. A. B 127

Scaled proposals will be received at the office of the Division Engineer, H. G. Oakes, Plymouth, Michigan, until 2:00 o'clock p. m. Eastern Standard Time, Thursday, October 27, 1932 for constructing a bridge located on U. S. 16, at approximately station 741-75 of Road Project 063-8, crossing Huron River in Section 6, town 1 north, Range 7 East, Lyon township, Oakland County, about two miles west of New Hudson.

The substructure of two reinforced concrete abutments of the semi-gravity type with heights of 23' 11" from bottom of footings to crown of roadway. The superstructure is of the steel deck girder type (rolled beams) with reinforced concrete floor, concrete wearing surface, fabricated metal railing and consists of one 45' span with a 42' roadway and two 6' sidewalks. The angle of crossing is 80° and the bridge is on a 0.9 per cent grade.

Proposals will be received for Contract No. 7 for fabricating and furnishing structural steel.

Contract No. 8 for Complete structure except cement, aggregates, structural steel, and field painting.

Contract No. 7 must be completed on or before January 1, 1933.

Contract No. 8 must be completed on or before July 31, 1933.

Specifications and proposal blanks may be obtained at the office of the Division Engineer at the above address and at the State Highway Department, Lansing, Michigan. Plans may be examined at the above addresses but will be furnished only from the office of the Chief Engineer of the State Highway Department, Lansing, Michigan upon the receipt of a deposit of Five Dollars which will be refunded upon their safe return within thirty days from date of receipt of bids. Deposits of currency will not be accepted.

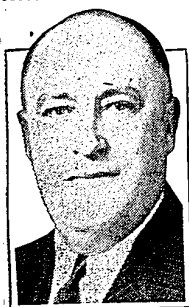
This project will be built under regulations covering the expenditure of funds provided for the purpose of carrying out the Emergency Relief and Construction Act of Congress of July 31, 1932. Special Specifications covering the employment and the use of labor will accompany the proposals for the work. Bidders must familiarize themselves with the requirements and must bid with the understanding that full co-operation in carrying out the special specifications will be expected. It will be required that the contractor pay unskilled labor at a minimum of thirty-five cents per hour and shall pay skilled labor a minimum wage of forty cents per hour.

A certified check in the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) dollars made payable to Grover C. Dillman, State Highway Commissioner, must accompany each proposal for contract 7 and 8.
