DR. RAY G. TUCK IS GIVEN MEDAL FOR WAR HEROISM

Dr. Ray G. Tuck, wounded and disabled Pontiac World War Veteran, was presented with the medal of the Purple Heart by Gov. Roosevelt when the Governor visited Detroit Sunday, October 2. The medal was awarded by the War Department.

Dr. Tuck was rewarded for his heroic actions when, after being killed at the same shell that killed Capt. James Cook and Lieutenant Nelson, after whom the Pontiac Cook-Nelson American Legion is named, he dressed the wounds of the other men hit by the same shell before allowing himself to be taken to the rear for hospital treatment.

A citation presented with the medal tells of the heroic action, which took place July 30, 1918, at Courment, on the River Ouse, north of Chateau Thierry, where

Dr. Tuck was stationed as a medical officer with the 125th infantry.

The presentation took place at the Hotel Statler. Mrs. Tuck with other Pontiac women attended a tea and reception for Mrs. Roosevelt at the home of Mrs. William Donnelly in Detroit while Dr. Tuck and his escort talked with Governor Roosevelt.

ORR MEETS NEED FOR A FEARLESS, ABLE PROSECUTOR

Constitution And By-Laws Oakland County Council Of Veterans

Herewith is published the Constitution and By-Laws of the Oakland County Council of Veterans. It is the hope of officers of the Council that every veteran will read them thoroughly and become acquainted with the objects of the Council, which comprises all veterans' organizations.

PREAMBLE

For God and Country, we veterans unite ourselves together for the purpose of furthering the interests of all Veterans with unified action of all Veteran Organizations, who compose the Council, where such action is not contrary to the Constitution and By-Laws of the constituent organizations.

ARTICLE I—NAME

The name of this organization shall be The Oakland County Council of Veterans.

ARTICLE II—NATURE

(1) The O. C. C. of V. is a veterans' organization.
(2) No candidate for or incumbent of a remunerative elective public office shall hold office in the O. C. C. of V.

ARTICLE III—ELIGIBILITY

(1) Every post, camp or chapter of the G. A. of the R., the U. S. W. V., the V. of F. W., the A. L. and D. A. V. of W. W., located in Oakland County shall be eligible to membership in the O. C. C. of V.
(2) The privilege of membership may, by unanimous vote of the council, be extended to all posts, camps, chapters or similar units (located in Oakland County) of other organizations whose membership is limited to persons honorably discharged from the United States Army, Navy or Marine Corps.

ARTICLE IV—ORGANIZATION

(1) Each post, camp, chapter or similar unit in the council shall be represented by four delegates—the commander or his alternate and three others.
(2) At the inception of the Council, the three delegates from each post, camp chapter or similar unit will be elected for periods of 3, 2 and 1 years respectively and thereafter a delegate shall be elected each year to serve for a period of 3 years.
(3) Delegates, who will represent each post, camp, chapter or similar unit, shall be certified by such unit.
(4) All questions to be decided by a majority vote of delegates present except where one organization demands a unit vote.

ARTICLE V—OFFICERS

(1) The officers of the Council shall be elected annually from among the delegates and shall consist of a Commander, Senior Vice Commander, Junior Vice Commander, Treasurer and Chaplain. Each Commander will appoint his own adjutant, who must also be a delegate.
(2) No person shall be eligible for re-election to the office of Commander.
(3) The officers of the Council shall be elected by a majority vote of the organizations comprising the Council.
(4) The duties of the officers shall be such as are usually imposed on such officials.

ARTICLE VI—FINANCE

(1) The revenue of the Oakland County Council of Veterans shall be derived from membership dues and from such other sources as may be approved by the Council.
(2) The amount and time of payment of dues shall be specified in the By-Laws.

By-Laws

ARTICLE A. NAME AND OBJECT

Section 1. The Council existing under these by-laws is to be known as The Oakland County Council of Veterans.
Section 2. The objects of this Council are as set forth in the constitution.

ARTICLE B—MANAGEMENT

Section 1. Government and management of this Council shall be vested in its officers.
Section 2. Officers of this Council shall be elected and installed annually at first regular meeting held each month of January.
Section 3. Vacancies existing in any office of this Council from any cause other than expiration of term, shall be filled by a majority vote of the organizations comprising the Council, and members so elected shall hold office or offices for unexpired term or terms of said officers. A vacancy shall exist when an officer is absent from this Council for three consecutive meetings.

ARTICLE C—MEETINGS

Section 1. Regular meetings of Council shall be held on the first Thursday of each month at such place and time as the Council may from time to time designate. At such regular meetings there will be transacted such business as may be properly brought up for action.
Section 2. Council convenor, a majority of elective officers or any three units representing two or more constituent organizations of this Council shall have power to call a special meeting of this Council at any time. It shall be mandatory for the adjutant to give due notice of such special meeting upon receipt of such request in writing.

ARTICLE D—NOTICES

Section 1. Each delegate shall furnish adjutant of Council with his address for mailing purposes.
Section 2. Adjutant of Council shall cause notice of annual election to be given at least ten and not more than fifteen days prior thereto.
Section 3. Adjutant shall send written notice of all regular and special meetings to Commanders of each constituent unit and such notice shall be deemed to be due notice to all delegates.

ARTICLE E—RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. All proceedings of this Council shall be conducted under and pursuant to Roberts' Rules of Order, except as herein otherwise provided.

ARTICLE F—LIMITATIONS OF LIABILITIES

Section 1. This Council shall incur, or cause to be incurred, no liability or obligations whatever which shall subject to liability any one of the posts, camps, chapters or units comprising the Council or of the individual members thereof.

ARTICLE G—AMENDMENTS

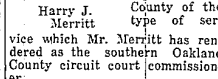
Section 1. These by-laws may be amended at any regular Council meeting by vote of a majority of the organizations represented in the Council; Provided, that proposed amendments shall have been submitted in writing and read at next preceding regular meeting of said Council and provided, further, that written notice shall have been given to all Commanders of Constituent units at least twenty days in advance of date when such amendment is to be voted upon, notifying said commanders that at such meeting a proposal to amend the by-laws is to be voted upon.
