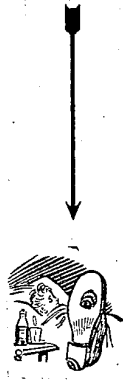


See This Boy!

Special meeting of the City Commissioners held October 10, 1932. Called to order by Mayor Lamb at 7:40 p. m.

Motion made by Gildemeister, seconded by Clerk, to name the election board for the election to be held November 8. Salaries to be the same as those paid at the primary election held September 13, 1932.

Mr. Zimmerman spoke to the Commissioners in regard to imperfect descriptions of property in the City, and asked to be given the job of making a survey and assessors plan to be made by him and correct tax roll can be made.

Mr. McAlpin of Birmingham spoke upon the subject also and submitted a proposition to the commission. Assessors plan and survey to be made by him and completed by July 1, 1934 for \$1,500.00. One half of this sum for \$750.00 to be paid by July 1, 1933. The remaining \$750.00 to be paid by July 1, 1934.

Motion made by Gildemeister, seconded by Hutton that the bid of Mr. McAlpin be accepted. Carried, Yeas, Gildemeister, Hamlin, Hutton and Stannam. Nays, None.

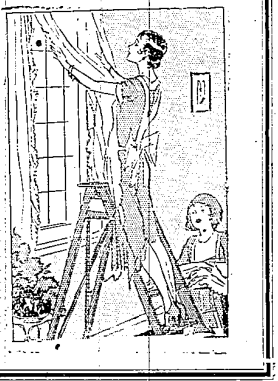
