JUDGE MCGAFFEY SHOWS ECONOMY AND COMPETENCE



Friends of Probate Judge Dan A. McGaffey, conversant with his record, have urged him to lay out in concise form, his achievements while in office.

"This Judge McGaffey has done, and the following statement contains the gist of a series of speeches he is presenting in various communities of Oakland County. Judge McGaffey hopes to be in Farmington sometime in the near future.

The Judge's record as outlined in his talks is, as follows:

"The economy started in the Probate Office long before 1929 and has continued ever since.

"When I took over this office the first thing I did was to reduce the cost of the office better than \$2000.00 per year.

"I was the first and only Judge in Oakland County who volunteered to take a cut in salary.

"I volunteered to do the work of a second Probate Judge in Oakland County for the reason that a second Judge would mean added expense to the taxpayers.

"When the Law made it compulsory for Oakland County to have the second Probate Judge, then in the interest of the taxpayers, I conferred with Representative Phil Miller and assisted in drafting a Special Law eliminating the second Probate Judge, thereby saving thousands of dollars annually to the taxpayers of Oakland County.

"This Probate Court is doing

more business than Kent or Genesee County. Genesee County has two Probate Judges with an office force of six—Kent County has two Probate Judges with an office force of nine. Oakland County has only one Probate Judge, an office force of three and the records show that our county handles more business than either of these counties.

"In 1911 less than five hundred cases were handled thru the Probate Court while in 1931 over two thousand cases were handled by the Probate Court. In the Juvenile Division in 1911 twenty-four cases were handled while in 1931 two hundred and fifty-five cases were handled and adjusted.

"Among the duties of the Probate Court are the:

"Commitment of patients to the State Insane Hospitals; Commitment of patients to the Feeble Minded and Epileptic Hospitals; Admission of all persons under age to the University Hospital and the direct charge of transportation of these patients to the Hospital.

"Under a system inaugurated by me, the County is saved several thousand dollars each year in the transporting of these patients.

"The Probate Court handles all children's cases, viz: dependent neglected and delinquents, thru the Juvenile Division. These children are committed to the State Public School at Colchester, the Boys' Vocational School at Lansing, the Girls' Training School at Adrian, and all Institutions where children are taken for care or adjustment and in homes supervised by the Juvenile Court.

"This Court has the handling of Mothers' Pension cases,—286 families are now on this list; Appoints guardians of minors and incompetent persons and supervises such guardians until the closing of their estates; Handles cases of adoption; Appoints administrators of estates of deceased persons; Admits wills to Probate and appoints executors of estates of deceased persons; Appoints Trustees to handle special cases; Appoints Commissioners on Drain cases; Appoints Commissioners on condemnation of lands for highway purposes; Appoints Soldier's Relief Commissioners;

"Fills vacancies in office caused by the resignation or death of office holders; Handles appeals from Drain Tax Assessments and Covert Road Tax assessments; Assesses Inheritance Taxes—In 1922 the amount of Inheritance Tax

assessed was \$13,531.13 and in 1929 the amount was \$680,347.43.

"The value of the property going thru the office in 1911 was less than one million dollars. The business has increased until the records now show that there is over twenty million dollars worth of property going thru the office in one year in the different estates.

"The work of the Probate Court has doubled and tripled in the last few years, but it is being handled with the same amount of help as was employed in 1911, (twenty-one years ago.)
