Neighbors who drop in of a morning find Mrs. Brucker's hands busy with things in the kitchen, and her mind busy with the talk she is to give at some club or meeting in the afternoon. Until this year she crowded into her days not only household work and public activities but also studies at Michigan State College, where she completed college work and won her Master's degree, last June.

Music is one of her chief interests. Women will be interested in the romance of the Governor and their visitor of next Thursday. They

were high school sweethearts in Saginaw, although they went to different schools, she to Arthur Hill High and he to Saginaw Eastern.
