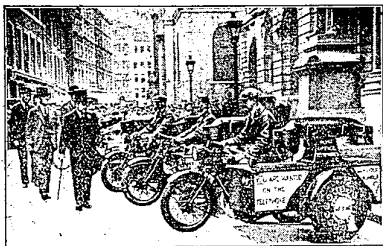


Modern Telephone Service in Great Britain Advertised by Novel Means

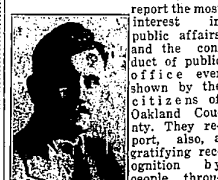

Hobbies keep children out of mischief and they relieve the monotony of routine life for adults. It is well to be able to lose oneself for an hour, an evening, or even for a day in something that is not related to the daily tasks, this author believes. A desirable hobby should furnish enjoyment, pleasure and gratification; it should require a minimum of equipment and expense. In Doctor Klander's opinion, many hobbies may be distinctly educational. Literature, music and astronomy are examples of that type. Physical as well as mental health may be improved by a hobby; sports are of distinct value.

Many hobbies are started accidentally without forethought. It is well, however, suggests Doctor Klander, that parents and educators should plan indirectly to guide children in certain desirable interests in order that their leisure time may be wisely spent. Recreation has become a necessity, writes Doctor Klander. The trends of the times indicate that the schools must include more training in the use of leisure time not only for the years that the student is in school but also for the time when he is an adult.

DAVIS SEEKING HIS FIRST TERM AS A CORONER
