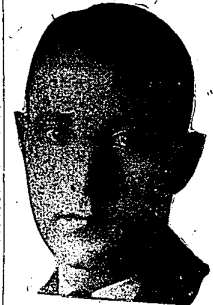

**CIRCUIT COURT
COMMISSIONER'S
WORK IMPORTANT**

Interest in all public affairs is
keener than usual this year, as in
all presidential election years,
but a number of public-spirited
Oakland County citizens are mak-
ing a special effort to focus at-
tention for the coming election on
one of the least conspicuous, but
nevertheless one of the most im-
portant offices in the County. The
office is that of circuit court com-
missioner, one seldom in the pub-
lic eye, but one which handles
matters of the greatest moment
to large numbers of citizens.

The circuit
court com-
missioner is an of-
ficer of the
circuit court,
as the name im-
plies. His work
is to act in the
place of the
circuit judges,
handling mat-
ters which they
ordinarily do not
need to go thru
the formality of
circuit trial,
with judge, jury
etc. If all these
cases had to
come before the
circuit judges, they would be
hopelessly swamped with work and
the docket would be so crowded
that delay would be almost en-
dless. The circuit court commis-
sioners, of which there are two
in Oakland County, handle cases
involving ownership and posses-
sion of land. However, the amount
and the problems before them
often involve as much as do cases
before the circuit judges them-
selves.

Because the office is one of this
nature, men and women in ac-
tive in urging the continuance as
a circuit court commissioner of
E. L. Phillips, of Pontiac. Al-
though he is serving in his first
public office, Mr. Phillips, they
point out, has shown to an ex-
ceptional degree the sound judgment,
the thorough legal experience and
the high integrity which the po-
sition demands.

His standing as an attorney
and as a public official is of the
highest.

Mr. Phillips is one of the best-
known members of the Oakland
County bar, having been a practis-
ing attorney in Pontiac for 15
years. He is a Republican.

**Bogue Unconnected
With Factions, Rings**

**Alva Declared Creator
of United Netherlands**

William the Silent is closely con-
nected with the three hundred and
fiftieth anniversary of the Dutch na-
tion, writes P. C. Gordon Walker in
the London Daily Telegraph, though in
reality he did all he could to frustrate
the emergence of a separate Dutch na-
tion, his feat being a United Nether-
lands, including the modern Belgium.
It is Alva, the Spanish general, whose
name should be in Dutch mouths as
the chief creator of Holland, instead of
being reviled as the cruellest persecu-
tor in history. For he found the Neth-
erlands a single, undivided district,
with Calvinism and Catholicism evenly
spread over the country, and with
greater linguistic differences between
the Walloons, the Flemish and the
Dutch than there was between Dutch
and Germans.

Alva it was who forced this district
into nationalism by driving Calvinism
and trade into the North. When he
retired in 1573 Holland had become a
separate nation. William the Silent
had resisted this, and three years later
he made a determined effort to reunite
the whole Netherlands. He failed, and
one of the causes of his failure was
this Union of Utrecht which Holland
celebrates but which was made behind
William's back and to his displeasure.

Thus twice William fought against
the isolation of Holland, but from the
Union of Utrecht to his murder five
years later he recognized the new facts
and fought for Holland as a country
against Spain.

The Origin of Great Order
The Knights of Columbus was
founded in 1882 by Rev. Michael J. Mc-
Givney and nine parishioners of the
St. Mary's Catholic church in New
Haven, Conn. It was organized as a
fraternal benefit association for Cath-
olic men.
